As the result of Provincial minor league championship hockey play here on Tuesday night, the Charlottetown Abegweit Athletic Club will be sending another team into Maritime title play in the near future. They are the Juveniles coached by George MacRae. Proving too strong for a combined Preetown Bedeque juvenile squad, the Abegweits sent them down to a lopsided defeat of 20-4 in the final contest to take the two game total goal round and the championship by the lopsided count of 30-8.

The smart young band of pucksters will now carry the Abegweit colors into the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island finals against the N.B. champions in a sudden death game to be played in Charlottetown, and will very likely be against the Moncton Juvenile Beavers, last year's N.B.-P.E.I. titlists. If the Juveniles follow in the footsteps of their elder brothers the Junior Abegweits, it will mean another Maritime title for the Abegweit Club. The Juniors swept through all opposition last week to capture the N.B.-P.E.I. and Maritime junior "B" crowns.

The Abegweits may yet have another representative team to compete for three-Province honors, depending on how their Midget squad fare out against the Summerside Midgets in Provincial playoff competition which is expected to get underway shortly. In any event, either Abegweits or Western Capital Midgets will be representing the Province for Midget hockey honors against the other seaside Provincial champs.

Hockey followers at Lennox Island will be a happy lot today, and well they might be. Coming up with powerful performances all season their Micmacs intermediate squad captured top Provincial honors and the Physical Fitness Trophy in the Intermediate "C" bracket by defeating Glasgow Road Maple Leafs 7-3 at Summerside Crystal rink on Tuesday night. The game was the second of their home and home, total goal series, and gave the Micmacs the total round by a score of 10-3.

Coached by Father E. W. McInnis, the Micmacs are an all-Indian hockey team and are a fine bunch of pucksters who deserve the title they have won by smooth, solid playing all season and are to be congratulated in bringing the title to Lennox Island for the first time. There is a very keen attitude in all sports at Lennox Island, and last summer entered their first representative team in Provincial track and field competition, and the day is coming when they will be making their mark in Provincial play, not only in hockey, but the many other seasonal sports as well.

Despite the fact that playoff hockey in the various brackets are at their height, the weather is more like the baseball season, and one at times can't help wondering how some of the outdoor, natural ice rinks manage to keep up a playing surface for their matches. Yet—they seem to be able to do it, even when the artificial rinks are having their difficulties in providing adequate facilities. What their secret? They don't say, but in any case, more power to them.

Yankees All Set To Win Third Straight Pennant

LOS ANGELES, March 21 — (AP)—Those who can't see New York Yankees winning their third straight pennant are entitled to their opinion but the chances are they will be sorry — again.

The world champions have come up with such a marvelous lot of new material that Casey Stengel isn't certain yet whether he can believe his eyes.

Incredible as it seems, the Yanks probably will not feel the loss of infielders Bobby Brown and Al Martin to the war scare. They might not seriously miss Ed (Whitney) Ford, their great young southpaw, now in the service.

And if, by any chance, Joe DiMaggio should feel the weight of his 36 years during the season and become bench-bound for a period, there even is an amazing 19-year-old who looks ready to step into the clipper's shoe.

Mickey Mantle, the skyrocket from Commerce, Okla., being groomed to replace DiMaggio, might well prove to be such a ball player as comes along perhaps once a decade. He played only class C last year and will be farmed out, but subject to instant recall.

Coach Tommy Henrich is giving the 190-pound youngster an intensive course in outfielding. There probably isn't a faster base runner in the game today, and he hits with terrific power from either side.

An infection in a leg bone makes Mantle immune to the draft, but appears not to affect his running.

Gil McDougald, a 336 slugger and slick infielder, has stepped right in to alternate with the veteran Billy Johnson at third base, replacing Bobby Brown, who is continuing his medical studies. Also, he can fill in at second, his favorite spot, any time Gerry Coleman becomes underweight and needs a rest. That was Al Martin's job before the army took him.

Ford's job as a starting pitcher might be taken over by either of two great-looking youngsters — Tom Morgan and Bob Wiesler. Pitching coach Jim Turner can't make up his mind yet which looks more "ready."

Even if the Yanks should fall to find another full-fledged starter from the outset, their plight would not be exactly desperate. In Vic Raschi, Alie Reynolds and Ed Lopat, they possess three of the game's really fine pitchers, and in Tom Byrne they have another who can be ornery when his southpaw deliveries are under control.

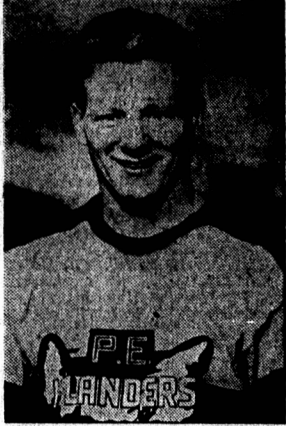

P. E. Islanders' flashy right winger, Bruno "Red" Favero (above) made a terrific comeback after a seven-week layoff due to ill health at Halifax last night when he pulled Islanders third victory out of the fire by sniping the winning goal for them after 18 minutes and 52 seconds of overtime play to break a 3-3 deadlock. Favero rifled home the winning marker at 8:52 of the second overtime period on a beautiful play set up by Wes "Buko" Trainor to give the Lamoureux-coached Islanders a 3-0 game lead in the best of seven series for the Maritime Major Hockey League championship. The fourth game of the series will be played at Halifax on Saturday night.
