

British Hockey Season Opens On Wednesday

LONDON (CP)—Streatham, the prodigal son of the British National Hockey League, rightly have won the honor of opening the season next month. Their return after five years' absence probably saved the league from extinction.

When the south London club dropped out in 1954 because of financial troubles, 12 teams were left to carry on. The number dwindled until last winter the abrupt mid-season withdrawal of Edinburgh Royals left four clubs to limp to the end of the schedule.

While recruiting is still in full swing, Streatham is guaranteed one link with the past when the team takes the ice against Paisley Pirates Oct. 7. The first player signed was Ray Maisonneuve, a leftwinger from North Bay, Ont., who topped the Streatham scorers when the club won the league's Autumn Cup and London Cup in its last year of operation.

talent. Among the newcomers are Ted McKaskill, a leftwinger from Kapuskasing, Ont., who joins Paisley, and leftwinger Rex Turple of Red Deer, Alta., signed by Brighton Tigers.

With the return of Streatham, league officials hope to restore a stability to British hockey that has been lacking since the sale of Harringay Arena a year ago forced the withdrawal of Harringay Racers, whose 11,000-capacity gates were the largest in Britain.

Poor attendance caused Edinburgh's departure after only half a season but the four remaining clubs—Paisley, Brighton, Wembley Lions and Nottingham Panthers—were satisfied with last season's gate receipts. The Streatham management is confident it will have no trouble getting its old fans back.

Their prospects have since been enhanced by removal of the entertainment tax on sport.

Grudge Wrestling Match Goes At S'side Thursday

Cupid and Sky Low Low versus Little Beaver and Farmer McGregor.

Dave Thelen Tops Ground Gainers

TORONTO (CP)—Dave Thelen of Ottawa Rough Riders retained his ground-gaining leadership of the Big Four football league last weekend but Toronto's Dick Shatto came on with a rush for a second-place tie with Gerry McDougall of Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

Shatto churned out 155 yards Saturday as the Argonauts defeated Montreal Alouettes 37-14 to run his total to 689 yards. McDougall rushed for 52 yards as the Ticats lost 9-7 to Ottawa but his total yardage has been compounded on 132 tries compared with 144 for Shatto.

Thelen—picked up 88 yards on the ground Saturday to run his total to 749 yards in 134 trips, official statistics showed Monday. Al Dorow, Toronto's new quarterback, leads in passing after two games on the basis of average yards for each completion. He has a 12.3 mark on 18 completions of 34 throws for an average of 329 and a total gain of 417 yards.

Tom Dubinski and Bernie Falcone of Hamilton are next with 9.6 and 9.5 yards respectively. Dubinski has 540 yards on 34 throws for a .607 completion average, best in the league. Falcone has been successful on 87 of 154 attempts for 1,459 yards and a .555 completion average.

Red O'Quinn of Montreal, retained his lead in passes received with 34. Montreal's Joe Wells moved into second place ahead of Shatto by grabbing six throws Saturday for a total of 31. Shatto has 29.

Wild Turkey Is Introduced To Manitoba Sportsmen

PLUM COULEE, Man. (CP)—A group of sportsmen in this Southern Manitoba area is working on an experiment to introduce the wild turkey—reputed to be one of the finest game birds in existence—to the wildlife population of the province.

The organization, called Wild Gobblers Unlimited, was formed in the spring of 1958 with the support of local fish and game associations.

The following fall 10 birds, purchased from a hatchery in Mandan, N.D., were released. Another six were kept in captivity in the hope of producing a hatch.

"None of the birds kept in captivity survived," said Bob Reichert of Plum Coulee, the organization's secretary. "But happily, all 10 of the birds released in the fall came through the winter in the pink of condition."

CONTINUE EXPERIMENT
Pleased with the results of the initial experiment, the group released 39 more birds—27 hens and eight toms—early last month in the second phase of the project.

Of the 10 birds originally released, four have since died, but they also hatched six poults, bringing the total population to 51 birds.

The wild turkey looks like a streamlined version of its domestic cousin. Toms reach a weight of about 16 pounds and hens about 12.

A non-migratory bird, the turkey is a rugged individualist. Mr. Reichert said that the 10 birds that survived Manitoba's severe winter virtually ignored corn and feed left out for them by Gobblers Unlimited.

"These turkeys prefer to rustle their own food," he said. "And this factor, perhaps more than any other, is encouraging to the sponsors of the project."

WILY BIRDS
Mr. Reichert said the wild turkey, when it becomes established, is one of the most elusive game birds "and experts say it is almost impossible to over-shoot a range."

The Manitoba group got the idea of introducing the birds to Manitoba after hearing of a similar experiment in neighboring North Dakota. Several exploratory meetings were held and when interest was shown by wildlife organizations, Wild Gobblers Unlimited was formed.

The organization is financed by contributions from fish and game groups and individual sportsmen. In addition, it is receiving publicity and funds from the sale of automobile windshield stickers advertising the project.

"Of course, the experiment is far from being a complete success yet," said Mr. Reichert. "We realize that any number of factors not yet encountered could result in the failure."

"But we're encouraged by the fact that the first release came through the winter so well and feel that with proper support, the chances of success are good."

Reeling Chicago White Sox Refuse To Be Counted Out

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The reeling Chicago White Sox refuse to be counted out of the World Series.

"We still have a helluva chance," said manager Al Lopez Monday in the somber Sox dressing room. "You still have to take four out of seven in this thing, don't you?"

Catcher Sherman Lollar, who blasted a three-run homer to tie the score at 4-4 in the seventh, said the Sox would have got "a tremendous lift" if they had pulled this one out of the fire.

"The way we came from behind after wasting all those hits, this would have been a great one to win and square the series," said the weary Sox receiver.

NOT FAR DOWN
Gil Hodges' game-breaking homer off Gerry Staley in the eighth, enabling the Los Angeles Dodgers to win 5-4, was on a sinker which "wasn't down far enough," said Lollar. Sherriff said his own homer over the "Chinese wall" in left came off a breaking ball, inside pitch by Roger Craig.

Lopez took some comfort in the fact that "we're supposed to be a weak-hitting team, but we're out-hitting them. We just haven't got those hits at the right time. The eighth was the first time in two games we bunched hits at all."

"Yes, that (Larry) Sherry has been hurting us," continued Lopez. "He comes in and stops us when we think we finally can get rolling. He's a damn good pitcher."

"You notice we didn't chance our base-running style even though that (John) Roseboro throws us out three times yesterday."

Lopez was referring to Luis Aparicio's theft of second in the first inning.

Little Aparicio just about summed up the attitude of the still poised White Sox players with:

"We can't get no breaks. We can't get the base hits when we need them."

Pace positions were drawn Monday and Adios Butler, driven by Clint Hodgins, landed the No. 4 spot. The bay son of Adios Debby Hanover, owned by Paige West of Snow Hill, Md., and Angelo Pellillo, Seaside, N.Y., is rated the 2-to-5 favorite.

Adios Butler won the Yonkers Futurity, Messenger Stakes at Roosevelt, and the Little Brown Jug at Delaware, Ohio, to capture the triple crown. Last week at Lexington, Ky., in a time trial he set a world record for a three-year-old hater.
