Washington Paper Backs Canadian View

WASHINGTON, (CP) — The Washington Post says in an editorial today that the U.S. state department should make no further approaches to Canada in the Igor Gouzenko case because of Senator William Jenner's "unwillingness to accept the reasonable Canadian offer."

The Post, which considers itself politically independent, notes that Canada has agreed to permit the examination of Gouzenko by congressional investigators on condition that Canada would have the final word on making public any of his testimony on Soviet espionage.

"The latest Canadian note offered a means of putting an end to this disagreeable and highly dangerous controversy." But Senator Jenner, chairman of the internal security sub-committee, has objected to the restriction the Canadians wish to impose.

"His unreasonable persistence has been carried much too far. He seems to ignore the fact that Canada has her own security problems and that as a sovereign state she has the right to manage them in her own way."

The paper says the committee wanted to examine Gouzenko "ostensibly to discover what extra light he can throw upon the activities and association of the late Harry Dexter White."

It added: "There have even been intimations that the committee might want to question Gouzenko about certain activities of highly-placed Canadian officials, including Lester Pearson, the Canadian secretary for external affairs. 'We cannot bring ourselves to believe that the committee would contemplate such a monstrous impropriety as that. Nevertheless, such rumors, however irresponsible, have vastly aggravated the storm of indignation and anger which the whole incident has aroused north of the border.'

Some very interesting points developed from a discussion about a survey on farm labour working and living conditions in southern Ontario. The gentlemen who led this particular discussion informed the meeting that more than 70 per cent of farm workers felt they could make greater financial progress than the city worker over a period of time. The conference was also told that the survey indicated that reasonable and regular hours were the most important factor in good employer-employee relations in agriculture. Second in importance to hours worked, were good food and living quarters. Strangely enough, good wages were shown to be the third most important item affecting good relationship, between farm labourers and their employers.
