TWO BLIND GIRLS Will Graduate
 HAMILTON, March 20 — (CP) — Two Toronto girls in this year's graduating class at McMaster University have done it the hard way: Both have been blind since childhood.
 Betty Macmillan, 21, and Gloria Mortimer, 22, will receive the degree of Bachelor of Arts in Social Science. They met at the Canadian National Institute for the Blind school at Brantford, Ont., and have worked together at McMaster to overcome problems.
 There were no textbooks in Braille so they had other students read aloud to them. And they developed a shorthand system so that they could take notes during lectures. Examinations were transcribed into Braille.
 After graduation Betty plans to continue her studies, then become a C. N. I. B. social worker. Gloria says she hopes to tour Ontario as a C. N. I. B. teacher.

Red Cross Establish Sickroom Supply Loan Service

Toronto, March 21—One of the most popular of Red Cross services is the Sickroom Supply Loan Service, now established in 452 centres in Canada, an increase of 116 over the previous year.
 "Patients, and those who have to cope with sickness and convalescence in the home, find free loan of expensive and hard-to-get equipment of tremendous assistance," reports Miss Helen MacArthur, National Director of Nursing Services.
 Fourteen more were added in January as one of the first Red Cross services in the new provincial division of Newfoundland. Attendance at Red Cross Home Nursing courses also increased in 1949, with a total of 4,628 women and girls attending 280 courses, taught by 250 volunteer nurse instructors.
 "Both services form part of the broad Red Cross program for the promotion of health and the mitigation of suffering which is supported by the Red Cross March appeal for \$5,000,000."

DEAR MISS DIX: I was a widower with children, married a widow with children, and there are children of this last union. Life has become unbearable in our home by the continual fighting between her children and my children and our children. Is there anything we can do about it?
JOB

ANSWER: Well, Job you certainly must be the world's greatest optimist if you expected anything else than a three-cornered fight between three different sets of children.
 The easiest way to settle your problem is to send the children off to different schools if you can afford it. If you have not money enough to do this, just accept the situation philosophically. They will outgrow their pugnacity in a few years, and in the meantime just let them fight it out without taking any sides.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: I am a girl of 19 very much in love with a boy of 22. My parents object to him because he is uneducated. If I marry him, I will be thrown with very different people from the ones I am accustomed to. Shall I marry him?
WORRIED GIRL

ANSWER: If you love him enough, neither his social position nor his grammar need make the marriage a failure. But nothing short of the grand passion can keep you from shuddering at a husband who murders the King's English and eats with his knife. As I have said, a great love levels all ranks and distinctions, but it is safest for those who are just ordinarily in love to marry in their own class, and this goes for birth, education and money.
