The following clerical changes have been made by His Lordship the Bishop: Rev. Father McLean from St. Margaret's to St. George's, Grand River East; Rev. Father McLellan from St. Dunstan's College to St. Margaret's; Rev. Dr. Morrison, appointed Rector of St. Dunstan's College.—Herald.

A PARTY made up from the steamship Carroll, composed of Capt. Briggs, Premier Sawyer, Messrs Trask, C K Decherd, W H Race, C B Sanford, E B Camp and Mr Rich and friend, took a carriage drive yesterday across the Island to Shaw's Hotel, Brackley Beach. The visitors were much pleased with our Island scenery and the good dinner supplied by the Shaw Hotel.

We learn from the Moncton Times that Mr. T. C. Conner, who contracted for the building of the Charlottetown Post Office, and who has been residing in Moncton for the past sixteen years, intends settling in Cambridge, Mass., where he purchased land some time ago, and will carry on building and real estate business. The province will miss a lot of his stamp.

The steamer Fastnet, Captain Hopkins, arrived here from Halifax Wednesday morning. She left for St. John's Monday with three passengers and will return here at daylight this morning. She sails for Halifax at 4 o'clock this afternoon with a cargo of lobsters, potatoes, oats and hay, shipped by E. H. Norton & Co., W. Matheson, N. B. & M. Rattenbury and others.

THE SS. Premier arrived here from Halifax via intermediate ports Wednesday morning, at 9 o'clock, with a general cargo and several passengers, and sailed on return via Summerside with a full cargo of lobsters, oats, pork, etc. Lobsters shipped by Jas. E. Grant, oats shipped by Carvell Bros. and N. B. & M. Matheson, and Mr. Hanaman and Miss McFarlan as passengers.

THE trotting brood mare Hernona, owned by John Newson, Esq., dropped a filly foal by Precceptor 5901, on the 6th inst. Hernona is by Hernando 2891; he by Belmont 33. Hernona dam is Morina by Belmont Membrina 761, a son of Almont. This filly inherits the blood of Almont, the great sire of trotters twice through her dam and through Precceptor the blood of the Mighty Nurood, Mam S. and Miss Russel. Hernona having demonstrated her ability to trot fast, horsemen would do well keep their eyes on this young miss so royally bred.

VERY SAD DEATH.—A very sad death occurred on the Boston train which reached here yesterday morning at 6 o'clock. Just after leaving Portland, Me., a lady, accompanied by her husband and infant child, who was on her way to Charlottetown, to her home for the benefit of her health, was taken violently ill and in a very short time died, despite all efforts for her benefit. A telegram was sent ahead, and at Bangor the body was placed in a coffin and brought to St. John. From here it was taken to Point du Chene. The passengers expressed much sympathy for the husband and child; the latter is only four weeks old. The officials at Bangor were very kind in their assistance rendered the unfortunate husband.—St. John Telegraph. The name of the husband is Mark Gallant, of Hyde Park, Mass.

MR. BENTLEY, of Richard Cole Lodge, No 697, A.F. & A.M., of Chicago, arrived in this city last evening in charge of the body of a brother Mason, John A. Storey, formerly of this city, who was accidentally killed in Chicago last Thursday in the discharge of his duty. The unfortunate man was caught in the cog wheels of a hoisting machine in the establishment in which he was employed and had both legs badly crushed. During the process of amputation he died. He left the Island about twelve years ago, and was in his 33rd year. He leaves a wife—who accompanied him here—and one child. The funeral will leave the railway station this afternoon at 4 p.m. for the People's Cemetery. Mr. Bentley would like to have as many of the brethren of the A.F. & A.M. as can make it convenient to attend as citizens. The deceased is spoken of by those who knew him as an exemplary young man, and his death is felt very keenly by his friends in Chicago.

Church of England Synod.

HALIFAX, July 5.—In the Church of England Synod yesterday the subject of King's College was brought up for discussion.

His Lordship Bishop Courtney wished to say that every clerical and lay representative was under the moral obligation to enlighten their parishes in reference to the collection for King's College. It did not matter what other calls there were on the pockets of the parishioners. He had neglected those collections authorized by the Synod was acting contrary to the best interest of his church. He personally had no party leaning and as long as he had any control over King's College it would not be a party institution. He depreciated its being a high church institution. The people were not asked to support King's College because it was a high church college, but because it was a church college with out any party. He had no quarrel with the high churchman, none with the low churchman, or with the broad churchman. He would ask for nothing better than to see these three great divisions strongly represented in the management of King's College. He wanted allegiance to church first.

Rev. Mr. Almon wished the college was one he could give his whole support to. He was educated in King's College but

to send one he cared for to King's college to get a divinity education now. He said the books used in the college were those of high church principles, which was altogether different from what it was when he was there. This was greeted with the clergy by groans and cries of "no, no," and when Mr. Almon was told by the chair that the hour had arrived to take up the election of candidates for the Provincial Synod, and that he would have to cease speaking, the members on the clerical side of the house applauded.

A motion was made that Mr. Almon be permitted to continue, but it was defeated and His Lordship announced that balloting for committee would begin at once. After all had voted Rev. Mr. Vroom, divinity professor of King's college, moved that Mr. Almon be permitted to continue his address, which passed.

Mr. Almon asked

WHAT WAS THE REASON King's college did not possess the confidence of the people. He maintained the views of the men turned out by King's college were wrong, and believed were those that would never be the views entertained by the mass of the people. He said the synod had no right to direct the expenditure of the money collected at the altar rail, and that as long as he was rector of a church he would never take up a collection for King's college until the low church party, as he called it, the true church party, was represented on the staff of the college.

Professor Vroom denied the statement that there were text books in use in King's college that contained high church teachings.

Mr. Almon was given the floor for five minutes longer to explain. A list of the books used in King's college was put in the rev. gentleman's hand from which to point out any he considered written on party lines or high church lines.

Mr. Almon enumerated five books which the divinity professor of King's replied were simply books of reference and not text books.

Canon Maynard thought the parties were gradually amalgamating and said he looked forward to the time when no breach would be seen in the church.

Bishop Courtney took the privilege of speaking the second time and had the dean take the chair. He would be pleased if to him was accorded the inception of the debate, as nothing tended more to concord than ventilation. He would have been sorry had the teaching of King's college been proved to be low church, as then it would be a party not a church institution. He would not have thought it a matter of reproach had it been shown that high church books were being used in the college; for how could young men going into the world expect to defend their faith if they were not acquainted with the writings of other sects and parties. He said religious matters were in a state of flux, the same as in many other matters. He advised the laity to criticize what they might see wrong in King's college and give the governors the benefit of their different views.

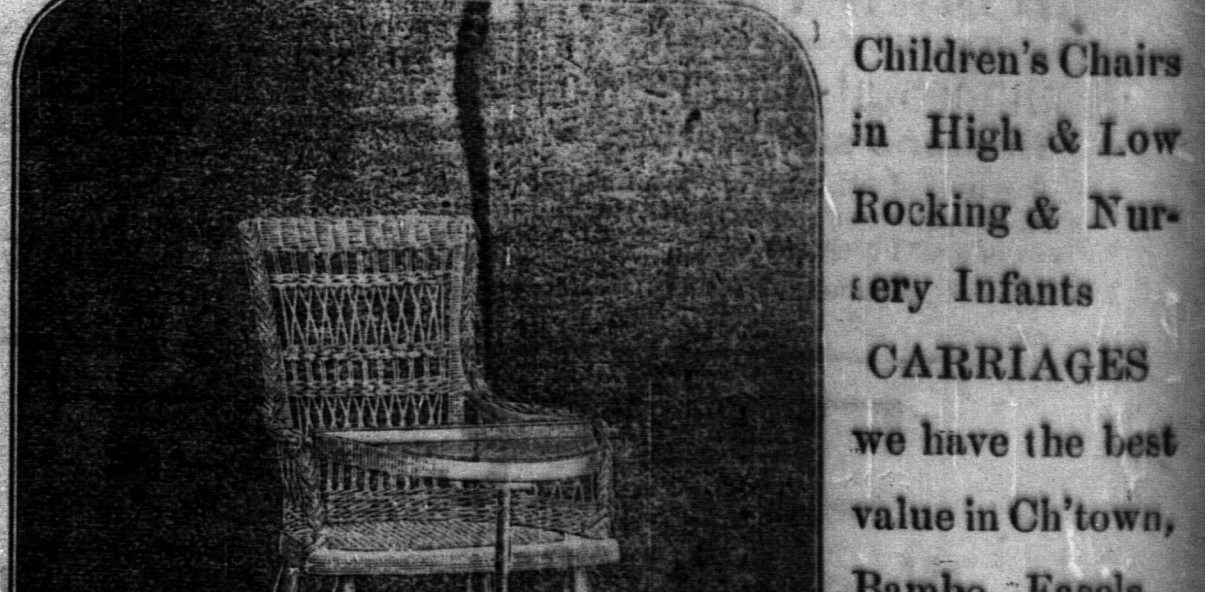
