Missionary Groups Have Service At United Church

The Presbyterian and Anglican Missionary groups of Kensington were guests of the United Church W.M.S. on Wednesday afternoon for a joint worship and study session featuring Japan. Each group is studying Japan and the missionary work being done there by its own denomination and each contributed to the program.

Mrs. Alexander MacKay, president of the United Church auxiliary led in the worship service on the theme "Love", and was assisted by Mrs. John W. Thompson, president of the Presbyterian W.M.S. and Mrs. J.G. Townsend, president of the Anglican W.A. Mrs. Russell MacKay was assisted by Mrs. P.J. Kennedy ushered.

Mrs. Elmer Moase, educational secretary, gave a brief history of Anglican missions in Japan, and told something of the assistance being given at the present time by the Canadian Church to the five dioceses of the Church in Mid-Japan. To illustrate she told the story of Shindo, a theological student in Japan who is being assisted by gifts from Canada.

Mrs. Horace Heckbert told of the work done by the Presbyterian Church which assists in the work among the 900,000 North

Koreans left in Japan after the war. The Canadian Church has assisted in training students and in the construction of churches. The growing strength of the church is indicated in the fact that in the past two years nine churches have become self-supporting, in spite of the counter efforts of the communists.

Information on the work of the United Church was given interestingly by Mrs. D. MacKenzie, impersonating Miss Mae Lachlan, Missionary for prayer of the Kensington group, in an interview with Mrs. A. MacKay, impersonating a reporter. She told of the polite ways of the Japanese, their love of beauty and cleanliness; their religions, Shintoism and Buddhism. Seeking 1,000 Members For Life-Saving Club This Week

This week a truly co-operative venture is being undertaken in Summerside under the leadership of Mr. Leo Blacquiére, chairman of the Summerside Red Cross blood donor committee. Mr. Blacquiére was appointed in this capacity by the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion, under whose sponsorship the blood donor clinics have met with such success during the past few years. Mr. Blacquiére succeeds Mr. Walter Duggan who did such a fine job as chairman of this important project last year.

In preparation for this year's Red Cross blood donor clinics in Summerside, the first of which is to be held at St. Mary's Hall on Wednesday and Thursday, April 30th and May 1st, Mr. Blacquiére and his committee have arranged to do a house to house canvass of Summerside this week when the objective will be 1,000 active members for the "Life Saver" Club which is being promoted as a means of assuring a record attendance of blood donors at the Summerside clinic. It is proposed to hold two clinics this year, instead of just one as has been the custom during the past few years.

Some 150 representatives of the following organizations have pledged themselves to carry out this house-to-house canvass in

Summerside this week: The Rotary Club, the Y's Men's Club, the French Social Club, the local Subdivision of the Catholic Women's League and Branch of the Canadian Legion. These organizations will be vying with each other to see which can solicit the largest number of members for the "Life Saver Club". Those in good health and between the ages of 18 and 65 years are eligible as members of this exclusive club but it is unfortunate that those who have ever had jaundice cannot now be blood donors.

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's general wholesale price index rose nine-tenths of a point between Jan. 1 and Feb. 1, its third straight monthly increase, the bureau of statistics said Thursday. The bureau said the advance in the index over the three months was almost entirely due to price increases for animal and vegetable products.
