GOVERNOR ROBINSON ON THE BAHAMAS.

GOVERNOR ROBINSON is now in the Bahamas. According to his custom, he has been taking an active interest in the material development of the colony over which he presides.

JUDICIAL POWERS OF THE CORPORATION.

So much has lately been said and written respecting the judicial powers of the Mayor and City Councillors, that we doubt if any further discussion would be likely to improve the case.

By a law passed in 1866, it is provided:—

Sec. IX. In case of riot, tumult or disturbance, or illegal acts of any kind, accompanied with force or violence, or a just apprehension thereof, in the City of Charlottetown, the Mayor, or Presiding Councillor, may, by writing under his hand, appoint any number of Special Constables, who shall be duly sworn to the faithful discharge of their duties, to assist in preserving peace and order, and such Special Constables shall be under the direction of the Mayor or the Presiding Councillor.

In 1875, certain cases of larceny were tried in the Police Court, the decisions in which created much dissatisfaction; and, on petitioning the Legislature, the following was enacted:—

IV. The administration of the Police within the City of Charlottetown, shall be vested in the Stipendiary Magistrate so appointed, who shall perform every act pertaining to the office of Justice of the Peace, for the apprehension, conviction, committal and punishment of criminal offenders, and for carrying into effect the laws in force and the ordinances and Bye-Laws of the City, and who shall have power over all offences set forth in Acts relating to the City of Charlottetown, for the trial of offenders in a summary way at the Police Court, or any other Act now in existence, or here after to be made relative to police business.

The City Marshal and the Police force of Charlottetown, and all Constables under the order of the said Magistrate is hereby authorized to execute the extra constabulary powers of the Mayor or any Acts

TREATMENT OF RIOTERS.

The New York Herald says:—"The Chicago police thought they did a humane and wise thing Tuesday night when they dispersed a gathering mob which had attacked them by firing over their heads. But they made a very serious blunder, and last evening they reaped the fruits of it in another riot. There is no reason in the world for being careful of the lives of a mob. It is a wild beast, and it needs to be shot down. That is the plain truth of it. There has been too much trifling with mobs already, and people set up a hullabaloo because a rioter, caught red-handed with a brick in his fist, is shot down. We trust the authorities in this city and State will give strict orders to the police and the military to "aim low" and to deliver as affective a fire as they can whenever they face a mob. A citizen can do no better work, be he policeman or militiaman, than when he shoots down a rioter. He deserves a medal from the State for it.

ST. JOHN RELIEF FUND.

PASSING THE BALKANS.

General Gourkha's operations south of the Balkans are of a nature to revive the interest in the story of the Russo-Turkish war despite the vivid excitement nearer home. General Gourkha's achievements are of the kind that extort admiration in any age and clime, and despite all distracting circumstances. He is the first of the Russian commanders to separate himself from all the others by the splendor of his successes, and his record already blazes athwart the twinkles of other names as a comet across the skies studded with undistinguishable stars. He has had a great opportunity, it is true; but General Schiller, who marched against the force at Pleyna, also had a great opportunity, and few men in this century have had such an opportunity as was opened to General Louis Melnikoff in Asia Minor. But these men threw away their fortunes and only lengthened the dreary catalogue of calamities due to want of brains that are so astonishing in the history of all Russian wars. General Gourkha, on the contrary, has used his opportunity to supply a chapter that would do honor to the military history of any nation in the world. He has emphasized again the eternal lesson that energy, audacity—the eye to see the happy moment and the will to seize it, are the great military attributes; that with them success is only gained where without them there scarcely lives enough in an army to march. Thus by his dashing passage through unknown way in the mountain, like a thunderbolt on the heights posted in the Schipka, his elaborate preparations useless, and enabled to make a bloodless march, Gourkha had done the work that has so desperately been attempted in Montenegro. Several thousand men have been killed, and if there are Russian service it is not of possibility to be kept out of the work Herald.
