**Try Triple-Play Publishing Plan**

LONDON (CP) — A Canadian newspaper Tuesday launched an unusual triple-play publishing operation. It did so by telephoting its front page 400 miles from London to Edinburgh.

The newspaper, Canada Review, thus published in Edinburgh Canadian news items collected in Toronto and edited in London.

Publisher Roy H. Thomson described the operation as an experiment. News items edited here were sent to Edinburgh. Then a quarter-size dummy of the front page, indicating story positions, was sent by telephoto to the Scottish capital, Thomson's headquarters, where the paper was made up.

Formerly stories were airmailed to London and taken to Edinburgh by train. The overnight ride proved a strain and it was decided to give the telephoto operation a try.

Canada Review, started 14 months ago, is a weekly newspaper designed for Canadians abroad and Britons interested in Canada.
