Cars Damaged In Collision

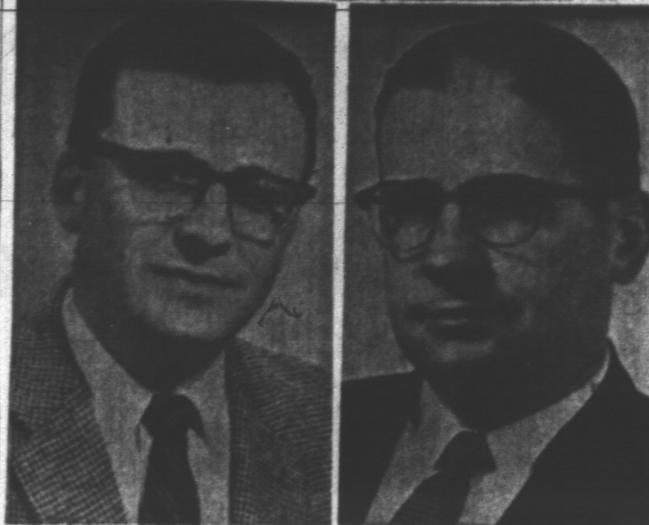
The combined damage to two vehicles involved in a collision at 10:30 yesterday on Market Street was estimated by the city police at between \$150 and \$175.

The collision occurred when a 1955 Dodge car, operated by Fulton Douglas, 70-Longwood Avenue, Charlottetown, in pulling out of a parking space collided with a 1960 Meteor, driven by Hon. Leo Rossiter, Morell. Both vehicles were headed in a southerly direction at the time.

The Dodge is reported to have sustained damage to the left front fender and headlight, while the Meteor was damaged on the right-hand side in the vicinity of the front door. None of the occupants suffered any injury.

MCA Awaits Approval For Change In Flights

Maritime Central Airways is awaiting approval from the federal postal department on proposed flight changes that will eventually see MCA move air crew personnel now based in Charlottetown to its Moncton base of operations, Farrell Gaudet, public relations director said yesterday.

The request was made to the postal department some time ago. No reply has been received as yet.

The flight changes were requested, Mr. Gaudet said, because of the pending arrival in Moncton of two new turbo-prop Dart-Herald aircraft. The Charlottetown terminal, he said, has not the equipment for the maintenance and servicing of these aircraft, and consequently they will have to be based in Moncton, with flights rearranged accordingly.

Previously planes used on MCA's flights out of Charlottetown remained overnight in the island capital's airport. With the changes in flights, the planes will remain overnight in Moncton.

"This change will in no way lead to a deterioration of Maritime Central Airways service to the island," Mr. Gaudet emphasized. It is planned to eliminate the "early bird" flight out of Charlottetown, but the change will not adversely affect the mail services nor will the number of flights per day be changed.

OFFICE TO REMAIN The airline's accounting office will remain in Charlottetown, Mr. Gaudet said.

Three air crews, comprising six men, and three stewards will be effected by the change and will be based in Moncton.
