SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Presbyterian Synod.

MONROE, N. B., Oct. 2. The seventeenth annual session of the Presbyterian Synod of the Maritime Provinces opened in St. John's Presbyterian Church here today. The roll call showed that there were present 118 ministers and 47 laymen, a total of 165, which will be supplemented by arrivals to-morrow. The first regular session of the session was held this evening, commencing at 19 o'clock. After devotional exercises, the retiring Moderator, Rev. Neil McKay, of Chatham, preached an able sermon from 1st Corinthians. The election of Moderator was then proceeded with. Rev. John McMillan, of Chalmers Church, Halifax, was elected by 68 votes to 35 for Rev. H. B. McKay, of Wallace. The College Board met this morning, with Rev. Dr. Burns, of Halifax, presiding. The committee is considering important matters in connection with the Theological College at Halifax. A discussion is likely to arise respecting the relationship of the Synod to Dalhousie College in educational matters.

No Pleuro-Pneumonia There.

OTTAWA, Oct. 2. A cable states that a cargo of Canadian cattle, landed by the steamer Horse King at Dundee, was suspected of pleuro-pneumonia, but Sir Charles Tupper cables that no disease was found in the suspected animals when slaughtered, and he believes the remainder will be released. Two other steamers' cargoes of Canadian cattle were landed to-day and passed without trouble. It is believed that the vigorous measures taken by the Canadian government are considered a sufficient guarantee to prevent the introduction of the scourge in England East.

The Mackinley Bill.

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 2. The Times is disposed to agree very largely with the Canadian Ministers that the Mackinley tariff must be recognized as a demonstration of hostility against England, hardly less decided than the Berlin and Milan decrees of Napoleon. The Times adds: "No reason can be assigned for it, except a desire to injure British interests." The Chronicle doubts the wisdom of Canadian Statesmen in stirring up a bitter feud with their powerful neighbor on account of the Mackinley bill, especially when the opinion prevails in many quarters that the new law is a prelude to a more enlightened policy.

Countervailing Duty.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 2. Manitoba butter makers, in view of the fact that the McKinley Bill imposes a duty of six cents a pound on Canadian butter, are asking the Government to impose a corresponding duty on American goods.

Teemer Wins.

EAST LIVERPOOL, Oct. 2. The race between Hanlan and Teemer was won easily by the latter. The race was for \$1,000, a mile scull down stream. The steamer containing the judges could not keep up.
