

Knights And Vics Divide Openers In Junior League Finals

The Knights of Columbus and Vics Juniors divided a double-header in the Junior League finals yesterday afternoon on Memorial Field in two games well filled with excitement and action. The series is a best-of-five affair. In the first game the Vics drubbed the Knights 8-4 behind Allan "Junior" MacLeod's seven-hit hurling. The second game, which only went seven innings, the Knights, after blowing a 9-0 lead over the Vics, won in their half of the last frame when a Vic double play backfired and Lorne Hennessy scampers across the plate with the running run to give the Knights a 10-9 win.

Both games attracted many fans who watched with high pitched excitement the play during the afternoon. MacLeod's pitching and his teammates fielding and hitting proved to be too much for the K. of C. team to overcome in the opener. The Knights took a 2-0 lead in the first half of the opening frame when Murphy homered into left field with a teammate aboard.

The Vics came back in their half of the same inning and tied up the game on the strength of two hits, two fielder's choices, and an error. The winners took the lead in the next inning when a single, a sacrifice, an infield out and a balk combined to shunt the run across the platter. In the fifth the Vics tallied three runs on three hits and a pair of errors. The sixth saw them score three more on two errors, two walks and a double. The losers scored singletons in the seventh and ninth frames to finish the scoring for the game.

Cliff Ready of the Vics was the game's leading hitter, getting three for four, while Murphy's home run and triple were the hardest blows of the game. "Spy" Ready started the game for the Knights but was knocked out in the sixth inning, being replaced by Burke who finished up. Ready was charged with the loss.

Flynn had five hits in seven times at bat during the doubleheader. McCullum, Glen Matheson and Cliff Ready each had four hits while Murphy and Reggie Hurhes had four hits for the Knights in the doubleheader.

The Knights of Columbus and the Vics Juniors yesterday afternoon waged two terrific battles at Memorial Field with the result that the Knights now hold a 2-1 edge in the three games. The teams split a doubleheader yesterday and the Knights had won the series opener. Next Sunday the teams will battle it out again with the City League title hanging in the balance. If the Knights win they will retain the cup. However, if the Vics win a fifth game will have to decide the series winner.

Chile Captures Tuna Fishing Championship

WEDGEPORT, N. S., Sept. 17 — (CP) — Chilean anglers won the tuna fishing crown of the world here Saturday in a contest that deposed the United States and saw the British team make a strong closing bid.

Tom Wheeler of Toronto, veteran bluefin angler, boated a 700-pounder after a battle of 2 1/2 hours. Another member of the cosmopolitan British team, John Kelly of Sydney, Australia, nabbed a smaller tuna earlier Saturday for his team's first score. They fought the fish in tough weather.

But the Chileans—making their first try in the seventh international tuna cup matches—coasted to victory by virtue of their score tallied in the first two days of the three-day event. In a tourney that found the fishing spoiled by a recent hurricane, the Chileans amassed 1,562 points. The British Empire squad had 1,614, Brazil 640, Cuba 563, Argentina 393, and Scandinavia 195.
