TRADE OF CHARLOTTETOWN.

Having as a people offered up our thanksgiving to the Bountiful Giver of all good for the abundant harvest which the farmer has gathered into his storehouse, as well as for the thousand other mercies of which we are the daily, but too often ungrateful recipients, we now purpose at this the close of the shipping season to glance at the industrial and commercial operations of the year, so far as these are within our reach. The Official Returns of the Customs Department are not yet accessible to the public. However desirable it might be to have such Returns thus early, sufficient time has not elapsed to admit of their preparation. Of the trade of the outports, we cannot speak at present. With regard to Charlottetown the case is different. Of its Exports and Imports (in part) from the opening of the navigation in April last, until its close on Tuesday, Mr. Donald Currie has kept a weekly account, taken from the Custom House Books, kindly placed at his disposal by the Collector, W. E. Clark, Esq. From that account, which we believe is sufficiently correct for all general purposes, we find that during the past season there have been shipped from this port:—

Table listing exports from Charlottetown including Oats, Potatoes, Barley, Hams, Butter, Eggs, and various other goods with their respective quantities and values.

This is only a portion of the Exports of Queen's County, which will be largely increased by the returns from the ports of Pinette, Orwell, Crapaud, Rustico and New London. At current prices the value of the produce alone amounts to £101,084, or \$323,456. The pork, ham, and dressed hogs figure up £12,453 or \$39,850; the fish, exclusive of the mackerel and preserved salmon, &c. £6000 or \$18,000—total £134,537 or \$530,000. Eggs at seven pence per dozen, represent £4570 or \$14,624; horses about £5,000 or \$16,000; and mackerel at £3 per barrel, £37,506 or \$120,000 of which about one fourth was owned by P. E. Island fishermen. The oats, potatoes and barley, were distributed as follows:—

The Turnips went nearly all to Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, and in very nearly equal proportions, 620 bushels were shipped to St. Pierre. In former times the most of our produce to Nova Scotia was sent to Halifax and the ports south of Canso. This year, several small cargoes of Island Potatoes, &c. cleared for Pictou, and Cape Breton. Of the Mackerel, nearly the whole went to the United States. The Eggs found their way into the same market, by the Boston and Colonial Steamers, but principally via New Brunswick. Of the Pork, Nova Scotia took 2130 barrels, 125 dressed Hogs, and 17,180 pounds Ham; New Brunswick 136 barrels, and 32 dressed Hogs; Newfoundland 234 barrels, 106 dressed Hogs and 6,035 pounds Ham; England 141 barrels, and the United States 60 barrels; 30 dressed Hogs. The Codfish, &c., went mainly to Nova Scotia, the United States and West Indies. To Nova Scotia we sent 5 Horses and 480 Sheep; to New Brunswick 175 Horses and 839 Sheep; to Newfoundland 112 Sheep, and to the West Indies 14 Horses and 424 Sheep.

We also imported 1,185 barrels of apples, 7,624 tons large, and 5,190 tons small coal, 3,777 tons limestone, 899 thousand laths, and 1,500 thousand feet boards, exclusive of deals and scantling. With the exception of the apples, the whole of these articles came from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; of the limestone by far the largest proportion was used for agricultural purposes. The boards and laths indicate the extent of our house building during the season. Perhaps, however, no fact connected with our import trade is more gratifying and encouraging than the marked falling off in the item of flour, which has annually, since the failure of our wheat crop, been making such a heavy drain upon our resources of the Colony. Next year we hope the decrease will be still more marked. Among our imports are also 6,678 barrels of herrings, and 1,058 quintals codfish. Of the 8,600 barrels of mackerel entered by the Gulf fleet, about 3,949 barrels, as near as we could ascertain, were caught in Island vessels.—Patriot.

The notorious James Gordon Bennett has sold his paper, the New York Herald, to Thurlow Weed and others. Only a short time ago, James Gordon Bennett, jr., was appointed business manager of the Herald, but his unsteady habits rendered him unfit for the position. The old gentleman intended his son as his successor in the proprietorship of the Herald, and not long since entrusted him with the business management of the concern, but the young man was too "fast," quarrelled with the father and is living a dissolute life. Only a few days ago, he was arrested in Broadway for drunkenness and disorderly conduct, and resisted and fought the officer all the way to the station. He is the young man who gained some notoriety as the owner of the Henrietta, the winning Yacht in the race across the Atlantic last year. He will probably soon fall heir to his father's immense wealth.

It is stated that since his failure to take Rome, Garibaldi has become insane, and quite as dangerous to his friends as he has hitherto been to his foes. He is said to be the mere wreck of his former self.

News by Telegraph.

St. John, Dec. 13, 1867. Ottawa, 12th.—Vote of no confidence taken last night on Holmes' Hudson Bay resolution; lost forty-one to one hundred and four. New tariff takes effect to-day. Spirits eighty cents per gallon; Tobacco five per cent and 15 cents a pound; Malt forty cents per bushel; Black Tea fifteen per cent, and three and a half cents per pound; Molasses for refining seventy-three cents for one hundred pounds—for general use fifty-five cents; Flour and meal twenty-five cents a barrel.—Gold 133 1/2.

London, Dec. 13, evg.—The tremendous explosion did not release Bourke; he has been removed to quarters of safety. It is wildly rumored that 20 persons were killed. Two men and one woman were arrested on suspicion of being connected with the outrage.—London Times counsels acceptance of President Johnson's views on the disputed question of naturalization and allegiance referred to in his message. Gold 133 1/2.

Dec. 17.—Clerkenwell explosion continues to cause great excitement in England.—The opinion of entire press is that time for lenity towards Fenianism has passed. Times says let there be no more clemency for Fenianism, which is a mixture of treason and assassination. Gold 134 1/2.

St. John, Dec. 14th.—Lord Lieutenant of Ireland has issued a proclamation declaring public funerals of Fenians executed for treason in Manchester to be sedition, and prohibiting such manifestations in future.—Gold 133 1/2.

The Schr Spray, McPherson, master, sailed on Tuesday for New York with 3966 1/2 bushels potatoes, and 11 tubs butter—by H. Perkins.

The Sch Mary Alice, Richey, master, sailed on Thursday for Halifax with 815 bushels barley, 520 do oats, 113 bbls pork, 6 puns hams, and 50 tubs lard.—by O. Coanally, Esq.

On the same day, the Sch Etta E. Sylvester and Aid sailed for Baltimore with 2,600 and 2,300 bushels potatoes, respectively.

Yesterday the Sch. Smith Tuttle, Saunders, master, cleared for Gloucester, U. S., with 1500 bushels potatoes, 540 do oats, 120 do turnips, and 8 dressed hogs. On the same day the barque Polar Star, Keefe, master, cleared for London with 23,000 bushels oats, and 1500 feet deal—by Carvell Bros.

This afternoon the brig Day Break, Levitt, master, cleared for Liverpool with 15,000 bushels oats and 1500 pieces deal—by John Lefurgy, Esq.—Patriot, Dec. 7.

The Sch. Seafarer, Hardy, master, from Pictou, arrived at this port on Monday.

The Sch Onward, Gowan, master, sailed on the 7th inst., for Halifax, with a cargo of barley, oats and turnips.

The Bark Prioresse, Balfour, has, instead of putting to sea, as we intimated in our last, came up to Peake's Wharf, on Sunday evening, took in the remainder of her cargo on Monday, and cleared the following day. On Tuesday, the Princess of Wales got up steam to tow the Prioresse and Daybreak, which cleared on Saturday, out of the Harbor, but owing to an accident to her rudder and the strength of the ice, the steamer was unable to accomplish her object. We fear these two grain-laden vessels, now frozen in at the wharf, will be detained here all winter, to the no small loss of their owners, Hon. J. C. Pope, and John Lefurgy, Esq.—Patriot, Dec. 12.
