

# Christian Family Group Hears Indiana Report

A report on the annual international meeting of the Christian Family Movement, held at University of Notre Dame, South Bend, Indiana, in late August, was the highlight of Sunday's annual meeting of CFM, held at Mount St. Mary's.

Dr. Robert and Sylvia Thompson, one of five couples from Antigonish, N.S., who attended the sessions at Notre Dame, gave a comprehensive report on their trip and the various seminars and lectures they attended, in company with 1,400 CFM couples from several countries, 400 priests and bishops, and 700 children of attending couples.

Dr. and Mrs. Thompson were introduced by Cletus and Edna Murphy, area representative couple.

In the area of inter-faith developments, Cletus and Edna Murphy outlined the procedure that might be followed in getting people of different religious persuasions together for informal talks, drawing on their own experience in this field.

On the same subject, Rev. Faber MacDonald described what is taking place in this area at the clergy level, where clergy men representing different faiths are getting together to discuss likes, differences, and social-economic problems common to all.

Other speakers included Rev. Andrew MacDonald, C.F.M. federation chairman, and Urban and John LeBlanc, treasurer couple, who outlined the new procedure that will be followed this year in payments of dues.

Following the meeting, which was attended by some 60 CFM members and chaplains from several parishes in the diocese, the group attended Mass in the chapel, with Rev. F. J. Ledwell, St. Dunstan's University, as celebrant, and the afternoon concluded with supper at Mount St. Mary's.

During the afternoon sessions, a choir of Sisters of St. Martha gave a demonstration of psalm singing. This was particularly timely, in view of the emphasis that will be placed on the study of the psalms in this year's CFM program.

## Broadcasting Licences Due For Renewal

FREDERICTON (CP) — The Board of Broadcast Governors intends to recommend one-year extensions of all broadcasting licences coming up for renewal next winter, a BBG spokesman said Monday.

Public hearings on 80 to 90 applications are to begin Feb. 1, 1966.

"It is the intention of the board... to recommend to the minister that all applications for renewal of licences... should be approved for a period of one year, that is, to March 31, 1967," the spokesman said. "The board, at its meeting Sept. 17, adopted this policy in the expectation that new legislation will be in effect before March 31, 1967."

A spokesman in Ottawa said legislation is expected to implement the Fowler committee recommendation that the BBG have power to cancel licences if broadcasters don't live up to programming promises.

The recommendation was made in the Fowler committee report on broadcasting made public Sept. 9.

The spokesman said the BBG will hear opposition to applications but barring exceptional circumstances will give a one-year renewal.

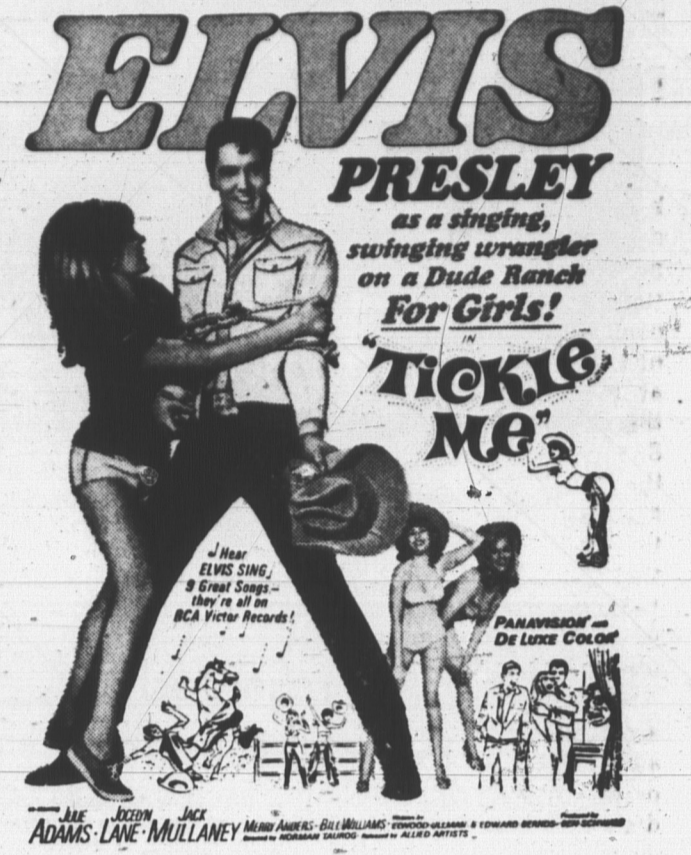

### Frost Threatens Tobacco Picking

Some of the province's tobacco growers who have not yet completed the priming, or harvesting operation were looking fearfully at the threatening frost last night, as they hoped for still a few more days of harvesting.

Though the last cold snap virtually ended the harvesting operations for a few—most of their crop had been harvested at the time—there were several who were still harvesting through the balmy weather which stretched through most of last week, and through the weekend.

John McCabe of Iona, for example, is one of the growers who escaped any frost damage, a reliable report indicated last night.

They have had no frost either on the Rustico tobacco acreage, the report indicated.

**STILL AT HARVEST**  
The growers in the Alberton area were still harvesting their crop up to last night, it was indicated. Leo O'Brien and Robert Hardy now have about 80 per cent of their crop harvested. Mr. O'Brien, said last night there may not be frost damage as "it is too windy" and hopes to harvest two more kilns today.

Mr. Hardy finished harvesting last week, taking in about 80 per cent of his crop as some frost damage occurred Sept. 18.

Despite frost damage in some fields, the yield this year is expected to be the best since Island farms started to produce the crop several years ago, reports indicate.

One reliable estimate said last night, for example, that there will probably be 500,000 pounds of leaf harvested here this year on 415 acres.

Last year there were approximately 400,000 pounds from 400 acres.

### Loses Arm In Mishap

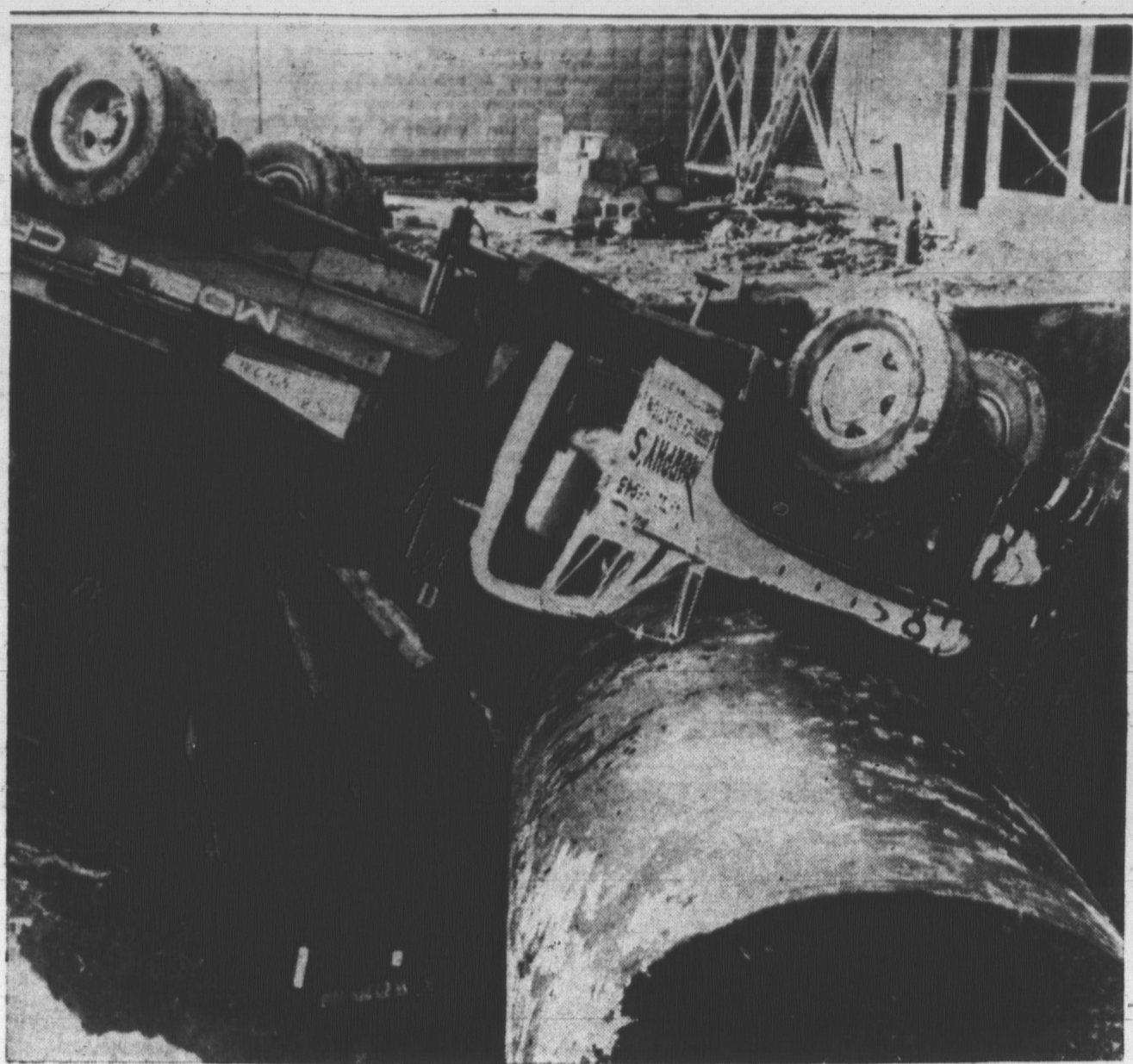

## Liberal Candidates Say No Liquor In Campaign

Emphatic declarations that they are firmly against the use of liquor to lure votes were made by Queen's County Liberal candidates B.B. Jones and Mark R. MacGuigan at a Second District Liberal Association meeting held at the Canadian Legion Hall, New Haven, Monday evening.

"One point Mr. Jones and I wish to make absolutely clear as we make candidates in this county," said Dr. MacGuigan, "is that we are unalterably opposed to the use of intoxicating liquor in any attempt to gain support in this campaign, and we are happy to add that our organization is in complete agreement with our stand in this connection."

There was applause from the audience as Dr. MacGuigan continued: "We seek your votes solely on the merit you think we deserve as men willing to engage in public service. We solicit your confidence in us and in the sound Liberal policies we believe in, and shall be espousing in this campaign."

**VIEWS ENDORSED**  
These views were endorsed by Mr. Jones when he rose to speak.

In his speech, Dr. MacGuigan took the position that Prince Edward Islanders are "a proud people quite capable and willing to stand on their own feet."

"We are not looking for more and more handouts from the public purse," he continued, "because that purse is by no means bottomless. The more we take from it, the more it will cost all of us and everybody else in Canada. All we seek is our fair share of what must be spent to develop the county as a whole and our own Island resources. We labor under certain handicaps, fiscal and otherwise, which should be recognized by the rest of Canada. Subject to this consideration, all we want is equality of opportunity to make our own living in a decent and dignified way."

Dr. MacGuigan announced to the meeting that if elected, he would resign his professorship at the University of Toronto, establish residence in Charlottetown and devote as much time to Island activities and affairs as he could, consistent with his duties at Ottawa.

In his speech, Mr. Jones said he is appealing to the people of Queen's primarily as a farmer who felt there was need for greater agricultural representation from the Atlantic provinces in the government of the day.

### Island Jerseys Large Producers

Several Prince Edward Island Jersey cows have qualified in record of performance tests according to the current listings in the Canadian Jersey Breeder.

Warren Grove Star's Lois produced 10,605 pounds milk, 693 pounds butterfat for breed class averages of 145 in milk, 153 in fat for owner Jim Vickerson and Son, North River.

Warren Grove Maid's Lyn produced 10,760 pounds milk, 578 pounds butterfat for BCAs of 143 milk, 142 fat.

A.J. Boswell, Marshfield, had a cow Marshfield J. Ginger produce 9,630 pounds milk, 579 pounds butterfat for BCAs of 127 milk, 141 fat.

All of the above were in the mature class.

**FOUR-YEAR-OLD**  
Myersbrook Best Generation produced 10,885 pounds milk, 527 pounds fat for BCAs of 148 in milk, 132 in fat as a four-year-old, for owner E.A. Myers, Hazelbrook.

Mr. Myers had a senior two-year old heifer, Myersbrook Acme S. Lady 8-S, produced 7,356 pounds milk, 436 butterfat for BCAs of 118 milk, 129 fat.

Coadydale Acme S. Claudette, a heifer bred by Paula Coady, Hazelbrook, produced 7,564 pounds milk, 456 fat for BCAs of 130 milk and 145 fat. This heifer in Mr. Myers' stable received a special certificate of 365 days with a production of 8,649 pounds milk, 526 fat. Her average test was 6.08 percent butterfat.
