Canadian Red Cross To Ship 1000 Layettes To Middle East

According to a news item received by Mrs. F. W. Hyndman, chairman of women's work for the P. E. I. Red Cross, more than two tons of Red Cross layettes, enough for a thousand babies, will be shipped from Canada the middle of November for new arrivals in the Middle East. These layettes have been made by volunteers of the Women's Work Committee of the Canadian Red Cross Society in all parts of the nation.

They will go forward in two shipments, one from Halifax and one from Vancouver, and consist of 84 cartons valued at \$13,620, and one of these cartons has been sent forward from the P.E.I. Red Cross.

The shipments are destined for Lebanon where they will be turned over to UNRWA authorities for distribution to mothers in refugee camps and hospitals of the Gaza Strip, Syria, Jordan and Lebanon.

Mrs. Murphy is the wife of the director of the Prince County Welfare Agency and she expressed gratitude to the group for their united effort to help those less fortunate than themselves.

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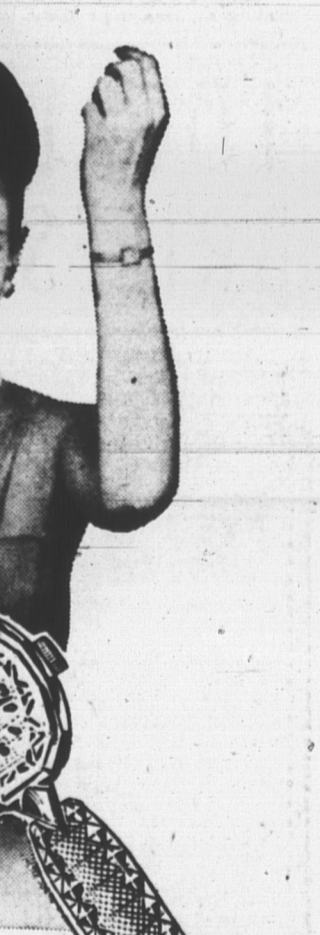
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
