The widow of Charles II., ex-Grand Duke of Parma, aged 76, is dead. She was a daughter of the late Victor Emmanuel I., King of Sardinia.

Americans manage to invent odd expressions. The other day a young American lady was at a London ball. Dancing heated her. 'I feel a little dewy,' she said to her partner, as she wiped the perspiration from her brows.

'Mr. Talmage,' according to the London correspondent of the Liverpool Courier, 'is to the religious world what Mile Sarah Bernhardt is to the fashionable society,' and has been delivering an address at Exeter Hall, a real live Lord, Lord Kintore, presiding.

Count Shouvaloff, the Russian ambassador to England, has been made the dupe of a clever swindler, who passing himself off as a member of a German Foreign Embassy, succeeded, on the basis of important information as to the forgery of Russian rouble notes, in inducing him to part with £500.

In a trial for breach of promise before a London jury, the fair plaintiff testified that the unfair defendant, offering her marriage, took his diamond ring off and put it on her finger and soon afterwards gave her a 'proper engaged torquoise ring.' That settled the matter. She straightway got \$200 damages.

His Excellency the Governor General had decided to distribute medals given by him to the Dominion as follows:—The exhibitor who receives the greatest number of first prizes for cattle, a gold medal. To the exhibitor who receives the greatest number of prizes for horses, a silver medal. To the exhibitor who receives the greatest number of first prizes for sheep, a bronze medal.

A colored jury to try a capital offence has at last been empanelled in Virginia. The man tried is colored, and he did not like that the jury should be composed of colored men. The verdict was, guilty of murder in the second degree—and he gets eighteen years of practical penitential life. At the first trial the gallows was given him—or he was given to the gallows—but he escaped the triple tree.

Mrs. Rhinehart and daughter, Miss Horiker, were drowned in the Sangamon River, Illinois, on Tuesday last. The young lady was to have been married on Monday, but her affianced failed to appear and in desperation she started for the river, followed by her mother. She plunged in and as her mother was attempting to save her both were drowned. Others of the bridal party narrowly escaped the same fate.

Mr. Nannary was obliged to send his audience away from the Halifax Theatre on Monday night, without giving a performance, on account of the absence of Mr. W. F. Burroughs. He claims that Mr. Burroughs refused to go on the stage because he (N.) would not allow B. to dispose of tickets for his own benefit as he pleased. Burroughs explains in the papers that Nannary is behind in paying his company, and that he owes him (B.) \$300 to \$400, and slight prospects of getting it; that he (B.) issued 400 of his own tickets for his benefit (as customary) which N. refused to recognize and forbade the sale of; that he (B.) then demanded \$50 from N. on account before he would appear on the stage again; that N. would not pay; and hence B.'s absence on Monday night.

East African Slave Trade.

A Bill has been introduced in the Imperial Parliament, by Mr. Bourke, for extending the scope of the East African Slave Trade Courts Act of 1873 so as to include any Treaty made by Her Majesty with the Government in Egypt in relation to the slave trade. Under this Act the East African Courts have jurisdiction over British vessels that have been seized by one of Her Majesty's ships on suspicion of being engaged in or fitted out for the slave trade. Mr. Bourke proposes that this jurisdiction shall extend to British vessels which in pursuance of any East African slave trade treaty, have been seized on this suspicion and brought for trial by the commander or officer of any ship belonging to the foreign State with which the treaty has been made.

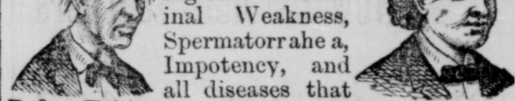
