The Canadian team won the Kolapore cup, at Wimbledon on the 20th inst. The score stood, Canada 609, England 589.

AMENDMENTS OF GRAIN CHARTERS.—The grain shippers of Baltimore have recently had conference on the subject of amending grain charters, in accordance with the circular received from London. The amendment was to strike out after the port of destination, "or as near thereto as can safely get, always afloat," and insert a provision requiring the vessel to go as near to the port of destination as she can get, and there lighter sufficiently to get in. The shippers say they, as a rule, do not desire the change, as all the smaller ports of Europe have their own regulations, and the change would place them at the mercy of the harbor master of the place. The existing clause, they think, is good enough as it allows a vessel that cannot get into a port of destination by reason of draught of water or other cause to proceed to the next nearest port. The change was desired on account of a case decided against a vessel in England, that had gone to a port other than the one of destination, but as the Supreme Court of England has not passed on the case the shippers here are content as it is.—Baltimore Sun, May 19th.

LONDON, July 20.

In the Commons last night in committee on the Land Bill, the amendment of Hugh Law, enabling the land court to quash all leases concluded since 1870, which it finds to contain unfair terms, and to have been forced on the tenant by force of eviction, or by undue influence, was carried: 201 to 109.

HANLAN'S REPLY TO ROSS.—A Toronto despatch, dated July 19th, says:—Hanlan will row Wallace Ross wherever he likes for \$2,000 a side, providing a purse of \$5,000 is offered, in addition to the stakes, by the city or town in proximity to which the race takes place. Hanlan considers it all very well for Ross to challenge him, when he knows that he can make more than the stake money where he proposes to row out of railways and privileges; but, if Ross likes, will row him on United States waters for \$5,000.

ANOTHER GREAT RACE AT LACHINE PROVED.—Toronto, Ont., July 19.—A delegation is here from Montreal, offering a prize of \$5,000 for an open race over the Lachine course, and a meeting will be held this evening at which Hanlan and Trickett will both be present to consider the matter.

BOSTON, MASS., July 18.—Jas. Keenan, of this city has attached the \$200 forfeit put up by Ross, and now in the hands of the sporting editor of the Herald, in his challenge for a race with Edward Hanlan for \$2,000 a side. Keenan says that before the race at Providence on June 17th, 1880, he took care of Ross, bought him a boat, and paid \$130 for his training, with the understanding that if he won the race Ross was to pay him back. Ross won the race and \$3,000, and since that time has kept out of Keenan's way.
