POLICE COURT.

John Crane Again Arraigned for the Arab Robbery.

JOHN CRANE, the young man charged with the robbery of money watches and jewelry from the house on Queen Street occupied by the Arab peddlers, was again arraigned before His Honor this morning.

The first witness examined was a young man named Patrick Mooney, who lives near Peake's Station. Mooney said he did not know Crane, and never saw him until he came into court.

While Mr. Mooney was giving his evidence, Crane's counsel informed the court that the witness was not the Mooney referred to by the prisoner in his former statement.

A shoemaker named Edward Coyle testified that a few days ago Crane wanted him to "swap" two watches for a pair of boots. Coyle said the watches produced in court by the Arabs were similar to the ones Crane wanted to exchange for the boots.

Another young man, named John Smith, said Crane offered him a watch for a coat, but he declined to make the exchange. The watch Crane offered him was similar to those shown in court.

Several other witnesses were examined, but they were not heard to throw any new light on the case. His Honor remanded Crane for eight days.

Another charge of larceny has been preferred against Crane by George Wheatley. Wheatley charges that Crane stole an overcoat from him in October last, and this morning identified the coat Crane was wearing as his property. The case comes up for trial eight days hence.

LAST NIGHT'S CONCERT.

St. Patrick's Hall was crowded last evening, and the promoters of the concert for the poor boys must have felt pleased indeed with the manner in which their efforts had been appreciated.

THE WHEEL.

Twelve bicyclists of Montreal, Conn., are to make a tour of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick in July. The total number of miles travelled will be about 1000, 500 on bicycles and 500 on the Atlantic. The cost of the tour for the two weeks is estimated at \$45.

MOCK PARLIAMENT.

Tonight the House will be the adjourned debate on the resolution: That in the event of the re-enactment of the Canada Temperance Act in this city on the 19th April, last, being defeated, would it be advisable to enact a stringent license law in place of the present free liquor act.

A NARROW ESCAPE.

A blacksmith named Philip O'Brien fell down the City Hall steps this forenoon, and for a time it was thought that he would not recover. His forehead was severely cut as a result of the fall. Marshal Cameron and some of the officers cared for the injured man, and did all in their power to bring him around again.

AN ASSAULT CASE.

Tomorrow at one o'clock Daniel G. Grant will appear before Edward H. Alleyne, Esq., J. P., and William H. Douglas, J. P., and will be charged with assault and battery at Peake's Station on the 3rd March. The case will be tried at the head of the Hillsboro River, and is exciting much interest in that vicinity. A large number of persons have been subpoenaed as witnesses.

A GENEALOGICAL CONGREGATION.

The Ottawa Citizen reports that the reputation for genealogy giving which the past was more than sustained on Easter day, when in answer to an urgent appeal for the sum of \$3,000 in aid of the building fund, the congregations which attended the three morning services gave \$2,468, which the evening offering swelled to more than the required amount.

ROBBERY AT WELLINGTON.

The Sunnyside correspondent of the Guardian writes: Two young men named John McIntyre and Frank Arsenault were arrested here yesterday morning charged with breaking into Hon. J. O. Arsenault's store, at Wellington, on Saturday night, and taking therefrom some clothing, boots, hats, also two dollars cash. They broke the iron bar which held the shutters and after taking these down they smashed a large pane of glass and crawled into the store. They put their booty into two valises and made off, borrowing without leave, a horse and sleigh of Mr. William Barlow's with which they proceeded to Sunnyside, leaving the valises, however, in a swamp near the driving park on the outskirts. Yesterday afternoon they appeared before Messrs. Leonard Morris and David Rogers on their charge stand. Both prisoners confessed, and were sent up for trial at the next session of the supreme court.
