TO THE FREE AND INDEPENDENT ELECTORS OF P. E. ISLAND.

GENTLEMEN ELECTORS:—

Twenty years ago I received from my people a very largely signed petition asking for a law to prohibit the traffic in intoxicating liquors. In response to this request my government at that time granted a half way measure,—a law entitled "The Canada Temperance Act, 1878." To day the scene is changed, and now my government is appealing to the free and independent electors of this broad Dominion, to say by a plebiscite vote, yes or no, whether they desire a law prohibiting the manufacture, traffic and importation of liquors, for beverage purposes.

The Royal Commission estimates the annual expenditure for strong drink to be about \$45,000,000. P. E. Island is one fortieth of the Dominion. I leave you, gentlemen, to figure out this at your leisure. Judges, lawyers, chaplains, prison officials, my leading statesmen, including, I believe, every Finance Minister, unite in testifying that the liquor traffic is a national evil, a domestic curse, that it is wrong in principle, cannot be restricted and ought not to be longer tolerated. The question of revenue, or adjustment of the traffic need give you no uneasiness, as my friends, Sir Wilfrid and Sir Charles, will be only too glad to see that that matter is attended to.

I desire that every free and independent elector shall go to the polls early on Thursday next. I do not ask how you shall vote. I only ask that as man laying aside all excuses, you go forward and deposit your ballot. If you do so, I have no fear as to the result. The result will be that this grand Dominion will proudly lead in the van of moral progress and set an example that will, ere long, be followed by every free and civilized nation throughout the wide wide world.

HURRICANES IN CHINA AND JAPAN.

Great Loss of Human Life

THOUSANDS HOMELESS AND STARVING.

Four Infatuated Girls Make Martyrs of Themselves

VANCOUVER, B. C., September 22.—The Oriental mail brought by the Empress of India yesterday morning is more than usually full of murders and sudden deaths. Japan and China have been visited by fearful storms. On September 2, six severe thunderstorms broke over the Yokohama district. In the harbor many vessels dragged their anchors and broke adrift. In the interior, rivers burst their embankments and houses were washed away.

At Kumoro a large landslide occurred and 15 persons are reported missing. In Tokio 467 buildings were blown down or damaged and about 216 houses flooded. In Gumma, Saitama, and other prefectures various rivers have risen, and bridges and houses have been carried away. On the Taka-do line, considerable damage was done to the railway between Kayama, Yamaki and Gotemba, and again between Okitsu and Kanabara.

The Nippon Railway has also sustained great damage. Heavy thunderstorms visited the Nayoya prefecture during which thirty houses in the village of Kamatsugui were destroyed by lightning, and several people killed.

A terrible storm passed over the island of Okiroba inflicting serious damage. Ten persons were injured, some fatally. During severe thunderstorms at Shaghai, a Chinaman was frightened to death by lightning, and six other persons were killed.

At Hong King, the steam launch Jean Laura, was capsized in the storm. M. Schultz, three Annamites and a Japanese lost their lives. Schultz was a Government official and his little daughter who was with him, was also lost.

A Korean paper reports that in the Magistracy of Koisah, over sixty persons lost their lives in the recent flood, and that a deluge swept away forty houses on an island in Chung Ju.

That old source of trouble to China, the Yellow River, so well named "China's Sorrow," is again giving cause for anxiety. According to the Tsinig (Shantung) correspondent the region north of the Anshan Mountains has been inundated for hundreds of miles by the Yellow River. The inundation was caused by breaches in the river's banks and the result was most lamentable. The damage is so widespread that several hundred thousand persons have been plunged into deepest distress, and many into absolute penury, which local authorities are unable to alleviate owing to want of funds.

Now that Germany has acquired territorial rights in Shantung, with other concessions, it is suggested the German Government may encourage German or Dutch engineers to prescribe a remedy for this annual scourge of the Hoangho.

At the feast of the Seven Celestial Sisters of Genii, on the seventh day of the seventh month, it is the custom in Canton and elsewhere for single girls to worship Genii. On the occasion of the feast this year four girls made martyrs of themselves. They tied themselves together by their hair, jumped into the river and were drowned.

British Consul Butler, at Kiungchew, has requested the American Consul, Dr. Bedloe, at Canto, to urge the Viceroy to send soldiers to Nodoo, near Hoehow, to protect the lives and property of American missionaries in that district. It appears that Rev Dr P W McClintock and Rev W J Leverett, of the American Presbyterian mission in the island of Hainan, were obliged to take their families and fly for their lives from Nodoo and seek protection of the British Consul at Hoehow.

Reports of the rebellion in Hainan indicate the renewed success of the Triad Society, a band of thieves and rebels, who have been increased and strengthened by a hungry horde of pirates from the sea coast, and the lawless army committed many depredations by looting and burning a number of villages in Hoehow country.

A Journalist Shot by a Woman.

FOR SLANDERING HER HUSBAND AND HERSELF

The Trouble Arose Out of the Dreyfus Affair

PARIS, Sept. 24.—Madame Paulmier, wife of Ernest Paulmier, a member of the Chamber of Deputies, has added another tragedy to the bewildering intricacies of the Dreyfus plot.

Madame Paulmier yesterday entered the office of La Lanterne, and asked for M. Millerand.

Millerand was absent, and M. Olivier who was present, stepped forward to receive the lady, who without waiting for any explanation whipped out a revolver and fired twice.

Olivier fell to the floor wounded.

Madame Paulmier was taken into custody, and when questioned coolly answered "I wished to kill M. Millerand."

She explained that La Lanterne had slandered herself and her husband because her husband had written a letter to General Chanéine, Minister of War, with reference to putting a stop to the attacks upon the army provoked by the Dreyfus affair.

SECRET CONVENTION.

Reported to Have Been Signed Between China and Russia.

LONDON, September 23.—A despatch to the Globe from Hong Kong, published this afternoon, purports to give details of the secret convention signed at Peking on March 27. It appears that Hsu Ying Kiouei, of the Chinese foreign office, thereby concluded an agreement with St. Petersburg by which China ceded Port Arthur and Ta-Lien-Wan, stipulating that only Russian and Chinese war ships enter or dock at Port Arthur.

Russia, it also appears, gets exclusive use of the inner harbor of Ta-Lien-Wan, the sole administration of the ceded territories, and a tract of land north of Ta-Lien-Wan is designated as a buffer-belt.
