ANARCHY.

Important Arrest of Wholesale Murderers.

CHICAGO AGITATED.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 17. Inspector Bonfield this morning took five special officers, surrounded a house in the vicinity of Ashland Street, and arrested the owner and captured twelve dynamite bombs, revolvers and knives. He subsequently arrested two other men in the neighborhood. About twenty determined murderers were in the conspiracy. At a certain hour after midnight to-night they were to be at the homes of Judges Gunnell, Gary, himself (Bonfield), Frank Walker, General Stiles and others, prominent in the prosecution of the Anarchists. Dynamite was to be placed beneath the houses and the powerful explosives were to be touched off simultaneously. The Board of Trade was to be blown to the sky and at the same time a wholesale reign of terror was to be inaugurated.

The arrested men are Bohemians. The ring-leader, Hronek, is a cabinet maker. The other men are Frank Chapek and Frank Hebowka, tailors. These three men were at the Haymarket massacre. Hronek secured a number of bombs and dynamite from a friend of the cause that fatal evening. Chief Hubbard says there will be more arrests made to-night.

Declaration Day in Cumberland.

AMHERST, N. S., July 17. A. R. Dickey was duly declared elected by a majority of 764 votes; the total vote standing, Dickey, 2,391; Casey, 1,727; Dickey's vote exceeding that of Sir Charles Tupper in November last by 23. This is considered a splendid showing, and proves that Cumberland is still solid for the Liberal-Conservatives. Messrs. Dickey and Casey addressed a large meeting in Music Hall after the adjournment of the Returning Officer's court. The best of feeling prevailed. Mr. Dickey read a telegram from his father in London, as follows:—"All here congratulate you. Chignecto all right."

Meaning that the success of the Chignecto Marine Railway is assured. This was, of course, greeted with loud applause.

Sovereign Great Priory.

TORONTO, July 17. The annual session of the Sovereign Great Priory was held here to-day. Supreme Grand Master Col. McLeod, in his address, stated in the matter of edict promulgated by the Sovereign Great Priory of Canada against Scottish encampments located in New Brunswick, that he recommended its removal as the means of an amicable settlement of the difficulty. D. F. Matthews, of St. John, was elected Provincial Prior for New Brunswick, and L. B. Archibald, of Truro, for Nova Scotia. Annual communication of the Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M. commences here to-morrow. An unusually large number of delegates have arrived.

Men Drowned.

WINNIPEG, July 17. M. J. Wright, Government Analyst, was drowned yesterday afternoon in the Red River. He was sailing in a canoe when a gust of wind upset it.

PETERBORO, Ont., July 17. Word reached town to-day that John Crowley, of Harvey, was drowned in Pigeon Lake. He and J. Connors, of Otanabee, were returning from Bobcaygeon when the boat was struck by a squall and Crowley was thrown out and drowned.

Health of Hon. Edward Blake.

TORONTO, July 17. The latest about Hon. Edward Blake is that he will return to Canada in poorer health than when he left. He was benefited by his sojourn in Italy; but on reaching England his old trouble became as bad as ever, and since then there has been no improvement.

MONCTON, July 17. The Grand Lodge, I. O. G. T., opened its session here to-day. Across the main street from Robinson's Hall to the Queen's Hotel floated on the breeze a string of flags in the centre of which was the Good Templar flag of Dominion Lodge, and on either side hung the Stars and Stripes and English ensign, presenting a gay and festive appearance.

Stanley's Fate.

BRUSSELS, July 17. Col. Sir Francis De Winton, President of Emin Bey relief committee, in an interview with the King of Belgians expressed the belief that the white pasha reported to have arrived at Bahrelgazel is Henry M. Stanley.

Railway Fire.

BARRIE, Ont., July 17. A fire broke out in the roundhouse at Allandale last night, which was totally consumed, together with engine No. 28, one of the best engines in the yard. It cost \$12,000.

Wimbeldon Shooting.

LONDON, July 17. Sergt. Wilson won the London Municipality prize at the Wimbeldon shooting tournament. Private Fulton of the 13th Middlesex Regiment won the Queen's prize. Score 280.

An Appeal Case.

MONTEAL, July 17. The Crown to-day served notice of appeal upon one of Counsel for J. C. Ayer & Co. in the recent customs case decided by Chief Justice Ritchie.

The Mills Bill.

WASHINGTON, July 17. Chairman Mills said this afternoon that the House will finish the consideration of the tariff bill to-morrow or Thursday and an effort will be made to get a final vote on Saturday.

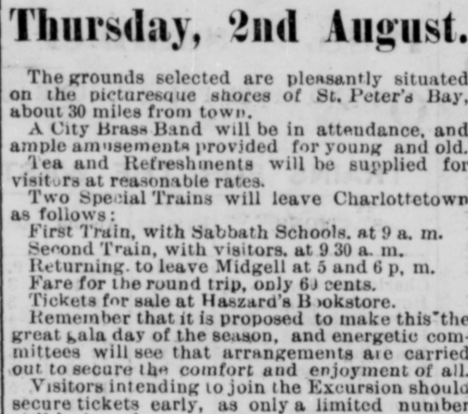
