

Says Canada's Ships May Be Driven Out Of Inland Waters If Law Unchanged

MONTREAL (CP) — The royal commission on coasting trade was told Tuesday that a situation could develop with completion of the St. Lawrence seaway whereby Canadian shipping would be driven from inland waters and the Canadian shipping industry ruined.

The four prospect was presented to the three-man commission by the St. Lawrence municipal bureau of the city of Montreal.

The commission, headed by Mr. Justice W. F. Spence of Toronto, opened a two-week sitting in the world's largest inland port. Other commission members are W. N. Wickwire of Halifax and Marcel Belanger of Quebec.

She had Barott, a former captain of the Black Watch, summoned to the mayor's office where she could talk with him. Later Barott said they chatted about camp experiences—"nothing harrowing, just pleasant incidents."
