George Cromwell of CHSJ Saint John, N.B., was elected Tuesday as president of the Atlantic Association of Broadcasters. He succeeds Willard A. Bishop of KEN Kentville, N.S.

Other officers elected at concluding sessions of the 18th annual AAB convention here were: 1st vice-President Norris Nathanson of CJCB Sydney, second Vice-President Orville Pulsifer of CHNS Halifax and Secretary-Treasurer Bob Lockhart of CFBC Saint John.

Mr. Bishop was elected the AAB's new radio director in the Canadian Association of Broadcasters for a two-year term.

Re-appointed for one year terms were Mr. Cromwell, as a television director, and Jack Fenely of CFNB Fredericton, as a radio director.

Saint John was chosen as the site of the 1967 convention.

HOSPITALS FOR CAPITAL
OTTAWA (CP) — A \$25,000,000 teaching hospital to be built here in the next eight years will make Ottawa a major medical and teaching centre, says the Ontario Hospitals Service Commission in a report on the city's hospital needs. The teaching hospital, to be owned by the University of Ottawa is one of four to be erected in the Ottawa area by 1975. When completed, the city's present shortage of hospital beds will be erased and a surplus of 195 beds is forecast.

Centre Gallery Opening Termed Most Unusual

Opening at Confederation Centre Art Gallery last night was a most unusual art exhibition — "Audio - Kinetic Environment" by Zbigniew Blazej. The exhibit is almost beyond description. It is something to be experienced, not something to be told about. It consists of brightly painted, sculptures and paintings with phosphorescent and fluorescent paint, that became alive with movement; triggered by ultra-violet lights, which in turn are triggered by electronic music. The lights, the music and the art forms combine to create an environment for the viewer.

This is certainly the most unusual exhibit to come to the Confederation Centre Gallery in the gallery's brief three-year history and will be a delightful and exciting new experience for many of the Islanders who have an opportunity to see it while it is here. The exhibit will be at Confederation Centre until October 7.

FRANTIC FEELING
I found viewing the exhibit yesterday quite exciting, and a bit eerie. For me it was like looking back, or forward, to the time in which I'm living-seeing

the clean, contemporary lines of architecture, mixed with gaudy color and wild music - giving a frantic feeling in a quiet atmosphere.

The electronic musical composition which triggers the exhibition was composed by electronic composer, Terry Russell in Toronto and taped in the CBC's sound laboratory.

Mr. Blazej said that the exhibition works equally well with classical, semi-classical, or rock and roll music, but noted that the electronic music was chosen because he felt that it, in itself, was more than likely without any prior associations as far as the average viewer was concerned. He added "I hope that the exhibit will be a new and totally unrelated experience for the viewer and with this in mind it was better to keep away from anything which he or she had heard before."

Constructivism, of which kinetic art in a present day development had its first public airing prior to World War I and was an offspring of cubism. However, it was not until 1917 that the movement was firmly established in Moscow. By 1921 the movement was dead in Russia, for political reasons and its practitioners turned to furniture design, the stage, typography and so on. Constructivist ideas have had considerable influence on architecture and decoration and particularly in the new non-objective and abstract sculptures employing non-traditional materials.

NEW FORM
The 24-year-old artist said "I've been lucky." He added "I'm young, and in-experienced and working a new form of art." This particular show, he said, was originally started for Dorothy Cameron's gallery and when it closed the Toronto Gallery took it over. They arranged the tour of the exhibit which has lasted since last winter and has been in several galleries in western Canada, spending the summer in Montreal, and now at Confederation Centre. After the show leaves here in October, it will go to Saint John, N.B. and from there back to Ontario. Next year "Audio-Kinetic Environment" will be part of Canada's pavilion at the "Expo" in Montreal.

Currently, Mr. Blazej is working on an kinetic outdoor sculpture, which he hopes to have completed for the Toronto
