**HEADS NEW DIOCESE**  
**VATICAN CITY (Reuters)**— Pope Paul VI on Wednesday appointed Msgr. Paul Emile Charbonneau Bishop of Hull, Que., to a new diocese with territory taken from the Archdiocese of Ottawa. The Hull diocese will be suffragan to Ottawa. It was announced. Bishop Charbonneau is titular Bishop of Tapano and a suffragan Bishop of Ottawa. The Pope also appointed Msgr. Rene Audet as titular Bishop of Coacoma and auxiliary to the Ottawa archbishop.
