

Hughie Campbell To Coach Islanders For Coming Year

Big Hughie Campbell, who last year coached Gloucester Miners in the Maritime Major League, has been appointed coach of the Charlottetown Islanders in the ACHSL, the Charlottetown Islanders, it was announced by Forrest Clow at a meeting in the Forum last evening.

Mr. Clow stated that while in a telephone conversation with Campbell, he would bring Islanders fans the kind of colorful hockey team they wanted, that he already has made contacts with several high-caliber men and that he, if necessary, will skate himself dizzy to make the local team a success.

Mr. Clow stated that a lot of things were taken into consideration before Campbell had been picked as coach. Everyone at the meeting agreed that under the prevailing circumstances, that Campbell was the best of the group of prospects who had been considered for the job. Hughie will be signing up the Islanders as playing-coach over the coming week-end.

The league which opens in Fredericton and Amherst on October 22 will hold a meeting in Moncton this Sunday. At this meeting the league's schedule will be decided upon and bonds from all the participating teams will be posted. The bond for the Islanders which has been posted earlier this week and a prepared schedule has been sent to the league president.

The club for the past few weeks has been run by an appointed steering committee. At last night's meeting, Mr. Clow was appointed to decide upon eight persons who would be worthy of election to a new club executive. Mr. Clow accepted the job and said that at next Thursday's meeting he will have the chosen few in attendance. It was decided that these men would be then elected to the different offices of the club executive.

Cloudy Weather For Game Today

CLEVELAND (AP) — Prospects for an attendance record will be hindered today by a prediction of cloudy weather as Cleveland Indians and New York Giants continue the world series here.

Forecasters at the weather bureau said there is a chance there will be a few light showers during the third game of the series. They said temperatures will be in the high 70s.

Some 66,000 reserved seat and box tickets have been sold in advance and the Indians will sell about 20,000 bleacher and standing room tickets starting at 9:30 a.m. Arthur (Happy) Felsch, a 52-year-old show attendant from Milwaukee, showed up Wednesday night to start the line at the bleacher ticket window. He spent the night on a canvas stretcher donated by a minister. Felsch, who says he attended 21 of the last 25 series, predicted the line would lengthen out Thursday night.

Giants Take 2-0 Lead In Series

Rhodes Is Again Hero As Indians Stopped 3-1

NEW YORK (AP) — Dusty Rhodes, whose 10th-inning homer won the opening game, blasted his second home run and a pinch-hit single today as New York Giants took a two-game lead over Cleveland Indians with a 3-1 world series victory.

It was Rhodes' pinch-hit single in the fifth which sparked a rally that broke pitcher Early Wynn's spirit after four hitless innings. And his homer in the seventh — a lowering blow which hit the upper facade in right field — clinched the decision.

Excellent clutch pitching by Johnny Antonelli, the Giants' young bonus southpaw, contributed to the triumph. The Indians had men on base in every inning except the eighth but they could never muster a rally.

HOME RUN

The lone Cleveland run came in the first inning when Al Smith smashed Antonelli's opening pitch over the left field roof for a home run.

Rhodes has become the individual stickout of the present series. As a pinch-hitter Wednesday, he hit the first pitch into the right field stands for a game-clinching homer.

Rhodes, a pinch-hitter for Giants all year when he had 15 hits in 45 times at bat, now has three hits in his only three appearances at bat. His home runs have been Giants' only extra base hits.

Now the two teams move to Cleveland where Indians have a gigantic task of overtaking the National League champions, Mike Garcia (19-8) is scheduled to pitch for Indians with Ruben Gomez (17-9) going for Giants.

Antonelli, in and out of trouble throughout the muggy afternoon, stopped a ninth-inning Cleveland rally spectacularly, fanning Larry Doby for the third time and forcing big Vic Wertz, hitting hero of the opening game, to fly out to left field.

Cleveland's constant threatening gestures kept a crowd of 49,099 fans on edge throughout the game.

Latest Pin-up Is Red-faced, Raw-boned Lad

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball's newest glamor figure—the "pinup boy" of television millions—is a red-faced, raw-boned swinger from the Alabama farm country who loves to fish and bat a baseball.

He is Jim (Dusty) Rhodes, who so far is Mr. World Series of 1954. "I ain't much of a fielder and I got a pretty lousy arm but I sure love to take a whack at that ball," the 27-year-old pinch-hitter sensation of New York Giants said Thursday.

It was Rhodes' 10th-inning home run which won the opening game 5-2 at the Polo Grounds Wednesday and it was another home run and a pinch-hit single which gave the Giants their second in a row over Cleveland Thursday, 3-1.

Early Wynn, his fast ball and knuckler working perfectly, retired 12 straight men until the roof fell on him in the fifth.

After Willie May's had walked to become the first Giant runner in the fifth, Hank Thompson lined a single to left and then Rhodes, the Alabama pinch-hit ace, was called in to hit for Monte Irvin. He dropped a Texas league single to center, scoring Maya from third with the Giants' first run. Thompson came home later when with the bases full and one out Antonelli beat out a throw to first to foil a double play attempt by the Indians.

BOSTON, (AP) — Three new faces, a mended leg and a pair of contact lenses are expected to spark Boston Bruins in their bid for National Hockey League honors this season.

Only 21-year-old centre Don McKenney will be new to Boston and NHL fans. He is a rookie up from the Bruins' Hershey farm club of the American League.

The other two roster changes are players who formerly wore Bruins uniforms but are back with the team after a lapse of a few years. They are 24-year-old Lorne Ferguson, promoted from Hershey, and 27-year-old Fern Flaman, obtained from Toronto in an off-season trade for Dave Creighton.

Chevyffils, Mackell and Leo Labine form one forward-line. Ed Sandford, second all-star left winger last season, has been shifted to right wing and joins Ferguson and veteran centre Cal Gardner on another unit. McKenney, Mohs and another vet, Joe Klukay, make up the third line.

For utility duty, besides Schmidt the Bruins have veteran Gus Bodnar, obtained from Chicago late last winter.

Bruins open their 31st season in the NHL at Montreal Oct. 9.

PROMISING PLAYMAKER

McKenney is a promising young playmaker who with the Bruins' sophomore left winger, Doug Mohs, paced Barrie Flyers to the Memorial Cup two years ago.

Flaman played all or part of seven years with the Bruins before being traded to Toronto in the 1950-51 season. A rugged, hard-hitting defenceman, he is expected to give the Bruins' rear guard the solid thump it has lacked since his departure.

Ferguson had a brief tenure with the Bruins a few years back. He has matured during two years in the minors, scoring 46 goals last winter.

"The mended leg belongs to left winger Real Chevys. Chevys' leg was so badly broken in a freak accident it was feared he might never again play hockey. Fortunately the leg healed perfectly and he has been impressive at training camp."

Hockey Career Of Art Ross Ends

BOSTON (AP) — The hockey career of Art Ross, the man who played the major role in making the winter sport the great attraction in the Boston area, came to an end Thursday night. Now nearing 70, he plans to "take it easy."

Ross, one of Canada's all-time all-star defencemen, who came here 30 years ago to help the late C. F. Adams launch Boston Bruins in the National Hockey League, is retiring at his own request as general manager.

In the following years he won three Stanley cups and several times his Bruins won American division titles when the NHL operated in two sections.

INVENTED PRESENT NET

He developed some of the greatest players the sport has known, and his ideas have resulted in several rules changes. The nets and puck now used are known as the "Ross puck" and the "Ross net". He also fathered such equipment as the "hat" which prevents injury to the Achilles tendon.

The fiery Eddie Shore, a pioneer among rushing defencemen, achieved his glory under Ross when "Uncle Art" was bench-managing the Bruins.

Ross, who gave up coaching a few years ago to become general manager, will be replaced in the front office eventually, perhaps in the 1955-1956 season, by Lynn Patrick, the present coach.

Patrick's post will be taken over by Milt Schmidt, veteran captain of the Bruins and one of the stars developed by Ross.

Schmidt, along with Bobby Bauer and Woody "Porky" Dumart while in their teens were brought down from Kitchener, Ont. as a unit by Ross and developed into one of hockey's greatest forward lines.

Ross also developed the memorable "Dynamite Line" of "Dit" Clapper, Cooney Weiland and "Dutch" Gainer. He developed such stars as centre Bill Cowley and goalies Tim Thompson and Frankie Brimsek.
