DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 13. In the House to-day, the following bills were introduced and read a first time. A bill to amend the Act respecting certificates to masters and mates of ships, by Hon. C. H. Tupper. This bill extends the regulations respecting the coasting trade so as to embrace ports in the West Indies and Islands of St. Pierre, Mig., as well as ports in the United States and Newfoundland, to which they now extend.

Sudden Death.

MONTREAL, Feb. 13. E. E. Gilbert, one of Montreal's wealthiest citizens and Canada's best known contractors, died suddenly last evening. He had been to Ottawa attending to business with one of the departments with reference to the contract for the Cornwall Canal, and arrived home apparently in good health. Being met at the depot by his coachman, Gilbert got into the sleigh. On arriving at Victoria Square, the driver thought his master very quiet, and upon getting down from the seat found him dead.

Appointed Bishop of Hamilton.

PETERBORO, Ont., Feb. 13. Yesterday Bishop Dowling, of Peterboro, received a Papal bull appointing him Bishop of Hamilton and promoting Dean O'Connor, of Barrie, to the Peterboro bishopric.

The Liquor Question.

KINGSTON, Ont., Feb. 13. The City Council yesterday voted down a motion to reduce the number of liquor licenses, but adopted a petition to Parliament in favor of total prohibition.

Their Pay Increased.

HALIFAX, Feb. 13. At the annual meeting of the Merchants Bank of Halifax to-day, the pay of the President and directors was increased from \$3,000 to \$5,000 per annum. T. E. Kenny M. P., was elected President.

Breakwater Damaged.

HALIFAX, Feb. 13. The breakwater and block house on Mine's wharf, at Cow Bay, C. B., were badly damaged by yesterday's storm.
