Toronto Leafs Wallop Chicago Black Hawks 3-0

TORONTO, Jan. 14 — (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs packed all their punch into the final 14 minutes of play tonight, walloping second-place Chicago Black Hawks 3-0 in a National Hockey League game here. The injury-riddled Leafs looked like third raters until gangling Bob Hassard drove two pucks past netminder All Rollins in the third period before 12,713 cheering fans. The victory left the Leafs in fourth place with 41 points, one behind the idle Montreal Canadiens. Chicago remained in second place with 43 points despite the loss. Centre Tod Sloan scored the third Leaf goal at 11:34 of the

Halt Work On Olympic Stadium

MELBOURNE, Jan. 14 — (Reuters) — Work of the 1956 Olympic Games stadium here was ordered halted today because of increased construction costs. Premier John Cain of the State of Victoria issued the order after it was found that the cost of building the stadium, a swimming pool and a bicycle track would run to \$1,500,000 — \$500,000 more than first estimated. He said his government, because of financial difficulties, could not increase its \$250,000 contribution. The Federal Government and the City of Melbourne were to contribute the remainder of the cost.

Distance Runner To Hang Up Spikes

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Jan. 14 — (AP) — Don McEwen, of Ottawa, the University of Michigan's great distance runner, has decided to hang up his spikes. He said he decided to accept an offer with an oil company that will send him to his native Canada for three years and then back into this country. Details have not been worked out. McEwen is scheduled to graduate later this month. During his four-year career at Michigan he set the world's record for the indoor two-mile run, the national collegiate mark for the outdoor two-and-four-mile events and the big ten outdoor mile record.
