Proposed by Benjamin Davies, Esq., seconded by Mr. Colin McPherson...

Resolved, That the Corresponding Committee above referred to, shall, as soon as practicable, after receiving the necessary information, prepare a report embodying all the principal facts, and forward the same to the Royal Commission...

The following gentlemen were then appointed a Corresponding Committee:—Benjamin Davies, Esq., Chairman; William McGill, James Robertson, John McKaig, Wm. S. McNeill, Esquires, and Hon. Francis Kelly and Edward Whelan.

A vote of thanks having been given to the Chairman, the Meeting then adjourned.

The Corresponding Committee met shortly after, and issued the following

CIRCULAR TO THE DELEGATES.

Charlottetown, January 10, 1861.

Sir,—I have the honour to acquaint you that at a public meeting of Delegates, appointed on behalf of the Tenantry, to represent their views and interests to the Royal Commissioners, which meeting was held at Charlottetown on the 10th January instant...

As Chairman of that Committee, and acting under the advice of my colleagues, it becomes my duty to request that you will call a public meeting in your vicinity, as soon as convenient, in order to learn how far the landholders and their agents have carried out the recommendation of Her Majesty's Commissioners with respect to the collection of rents...

The object of the Corresponding Committee in addressing you this Circular is to ascertain, as far as possible, to what extent the recommendation of the Commissioners has been disregarded by the landholders, and to abstain from harsh proceedings against their tenantry, and not to seek for the recovery of more than one year's rent.

It is very desirable that this information should be of the most authentic character, and as far as it can be conveniently made, in order that the Corresponding Committee may refer to the Commissioners the condition of the Tenantry since the closing of their Court in this Island.

I have also to suggest, with the advice and concurrence of my colleagues, the propriety of forming a Society in your vicinity—should circumstances render it practicable—for the purpose of proceeding unopposed against arbitrary aggression, when that object can be attained without infringing the legitimate rights of the Land claimants...

A CHANGE FOR THE WORSE.

We notice in the charge delivered by his Lordship the Chief Justice, to the Grand Jury, at the opening of the present Hilary term in Queen's County, the following remarks on the lamentable increase of crime in this County:—

"It is lamentable that the criminal calendar for this Term contains several offences of the gravest character—two of manslaughter, one of arson, a highway robbery, accompanied with violence to the person, a case of stabbing, one for rape; and of others of a lighter description—one for concealing the birth of an illegitimate child, two of larceny, and an assault with battery. This state of the county is the more to be regretted, as the almost total absence of prosecutions for crime in it, for several Terms last past, afforded the hope that a sound moral tone had permeated the masses, and that its beneficial influence would continue to be felt in the paucity, at least, of crimes of a capital nature."

"In some of the cases to be brought under your notice, the inordinate use of intoxicating liquors seems to have been the moving cause of their commission; and it is much to be deplored that no effectual revision of the License system has yet been devised, to preclude the issue of licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors to the low taverns where drunkenness is encouraged and indulged in by the dissolute and idle, to a certain extent it may now with some justice be said, under the sanction of law, and which cannot be considered necessary as houses of refreshment for the traveller or transient person."

"For several Terms last past," says his Lordship, "the state of the county" afforded the hope that a sound moral tone had permeated the masses. At the period to which the Chief Justice refers the Liberal Government were in existence, and during their whole term of office an incessant agitation was kept up by the Tories about the evil to the community of having a distiller at the head of the Government—the encouragement thereby given to intemperance, and the necessity there was for having the Maine Liquor Law introduced; or, at all events, such checks given to the sale of spirituous liquors as would amount almost to a prohibition of the traffic. It was, however, declared, that all these matters would be set right as soon as "the God-fearing Government" came into office,—intemperance would then be abolished—unexampled prosperity would crown the labours and enterprise of our agriculturists, merchants and tradesmen—the Bible would be constantly in the hands of all the rising generation; and in fact, the Island would be what Ireland was eight hundred years ago—an "Island of saints."

"The God-fearing Government" have not, however, produced this desirable change. We believe there is more real poverty felt than at any former period of our history—less business doing amongst mercantile men—less money and less merchandise at their disposal than in former years—not over and above two much religion, if we are to judge by the contentions and disputes between Ministers of different denominations, notwithstanding the "union" prayer meetings; and as for the alarming increase of crime, the Court Calendar and the charge of the Chief Justice tell the tale of a very sad change for the worse. We fear it will be a long time before his Lordship will receive a pair of white kid gloves from the Sheriff, at the opening of his Court, in token of the absence of crime from the calendar, which was frequently the case during the time of the Liberal Government.

SUPREME COURT.

Three days of the past week were occupied in trying, before a Special Jury, a case which excited considerable interest, between J. B. Cox, Esq., of St. Peter's, and the Alliance Fire Insurance Company. The latter declined, through their Agent, to satisfy Mr. Cox's claim for very heavy losses sustained by fire at Morell, more than a year ago, alleging that the fire was wilfully caused by plaintiff or some persons in his employ. A great number of witnesses were examined; but the defendant being unable to prove the allegation, the Hon. Dr. Young, Agent for the Company, abandoned the cause, and withdrew the defence, when a verdict was given for the Plaintiff, allowing him the full amount of his claim, £1983 Halifax currency.

At the close of the trial the Chief Justice complimented the Plaintiff, and intimated that no imputation could attach to his character in reference to the fire.

The prisoners convicted of crime during the present term were sentenced on Saturday last; but we have not yet been able to obtain a record of the judgments pronounced.

THE MAILS.

The Mail Courier arrived in Town yesterday morning, (Sunday) about one o'clock, bringing the United States and Colonial Mails. It is expected that the English Mail will be brought across the Straits to-day, and will, no doubt, reach Charlottetown some time to-night. The telegram, given below, foreshadows the leading features of the English news.

The Colonial papers furnish little or no news of any importance. We learn from New Brunswick that the prerogative of mercy has been exercised by the Governor of that Province in favour of William Munford who was convicted of murder, and condemned to be hung at St. John, N. B., on the 5th instant. His sentence has been commuted to imprisonment for life with hard labour.

United States papers are still chiefly devoted to the discussion of the Session movement in the South, which is carried on with unabated violence, and which is creating immense confusion, panic and distress amongst commercial and manufacturing people in the North, many of whose establishments have been closed, and their owners rendered bankrupt, on account of the suspension of commercial intercourse between the two sections of the Union.

PARIS.—The correspondent of the Herald says that the warlike preparations of France are on a far larger scale than at the same period in 1858. The Patrie says that Piedmont is purchasing steamers in France to convert them into men of war, and transports. A Berlin letter states that for some weeks past, purchases of horses have been made in Eastern Prussia, for the French and Piedmontese governments.

EMPEROR ERGENIE is not allowed to attend Cabinet meetings as formerly.

ITALY.—Siege of Gaeta continued day and night. A decree orders the provinces of Naples, Sicily, the Marches and Umbria, as integral parts of the State of Italy.

TURKEY.—The Jewish claims have been definitely settled. Are to be paid in full in Turkish coin at fifty three.

CHINA.—T. of Chinese Treaty is published. It contains reference to Mr. W's agreement to pay a very large sum to the Emperor, but telegraphic rumour, at Liverpool makes the sum one million. The British indignity is nearly three millions sterling, which is considered a small sum.

CALCUTTA, Nov 23.—Times says Nana Sahib is still alive with three or four thousand followers, in Thibet, and plenty of money.

CAPE GOOD HOPE.—British Kafraria was proclaimed a separate Colony, on 13th Oct. The territory between Rivers Kiskamma and Great Kei, constitute the new dependency.

UNITED STATES.

State of Mississippi has also accepted. Steamer Star of the West, from New York, with 250 troops, reinforcements to Fort Sumpter, was fired into and repulsed by the South Carolina Arty. Steamer put to sea. Sloop of war Brooklyn had sailed for Charleston. Gr at anchor in N. Y. and Wash. D. C.

Secretary has accepted Premiership (Secrets of State) under Lincoln.

The President's Message throws the responsibility of the Secession movement on Congress. He suggests restoration of the Missouri compromise.

IMPORTANT FROM WASHINGTON.

THE GOVERNMENT ROBBED OF \$50,000.

WASHINGTON, Dec 23.—The Senate's Special Committee came to no conclusion yesterday, the Republicans asking for further time. The most hopeful now despond, seeing no immediate prospect of reconciling the present political difficulties. Mr. Crittenden states that yesterday was the darkest day of his life. He is overwhelmed with a luteal for his country, and thinks that nothing can save it but the affection of the people.

The extremes of the committee were equally unyielding. The reported recent declaration of the President elect, that he will adhere strictly to the Chicago platform, has confirmed the wavering Republicans to that policy, and increased the intensity of the Southern feeling.

Mr. Scott, a Representative in Congress from California, has written a letter dissenting from Mr. Latham's statement that California would go with the North. He (Scott) endorses and justifies the action of the South, and is in favor of a separate empire on the Pacific.

The city was thrown into a tremendous excitement to-day in consequence of the Secretary of the Interior having yesterday summoned to his office the Secretary of State, Attorney General, and District Attorney.—It appears that Goddard Bailey, who has had charge of the Indian trust fund stated that he had taken a large amount of State bonds and coupons belonging to the fund, and that they were no longer in the possession of the government. Upon an investigation, in the presence of Bailey, his statements were found to be true. The amount abstracted is \$530,000. It is generally supposed that the bonds were used to raise money for temporary purposes, and that the panic has rendered the parties unable to redeem them. It is anticipated that other parties will be implicated upon his examination.
