THE SITUATION IN SHANGHAI

Becoming More Threatening Each Day.

IS LI HUNG CHANG PLAYING FALSE?

Arranging for the Despatch of Troops to the Far East.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

SHANGHAI, July 19.—A large body of Chinese is reported moving from Herpe in direction of Shanghai.

The situation here grows more threatening every day. The city is still without any means of defence and all the forts are held by the Chinese.

BERLIN, July 19.—Admiral Von Bendemann, commander of the German squadron, in his account of the fighting at Tien Tsin, July 14, says: "When the citadel was captured sixty-two guns fell into the hands of the allies."

BERLIN, July 18.—The latest series of Chinese attempts to gloss over the ugly facts which have been undertaken in Washington, London and St. Petersburg, and by Li Hung Chang, at Canton, is regarded here as a revival of the cunning campaign of lies, for the purpose of provoking discord among the powers and of retarding and weakening the joint campaign.

The impression in official circles here is that the situation is growing steadily worse and that Li Hung Chang is playing false.

LONDON, July 19.—A special commission is sitting in St. Petersburg daily to arrange for the despatch of troops to the far East.

It is announced from Shanghai that General Nieh has been killed, but there is no confirmation of the rumor from Tien Tsin.

Fears in London.

LONDON, July 18.—It is feared here that the whole of China will be ablaze in a short time. Sir Henry Blake is stated to have cabled that without strong reinforcements he will be unable to defend the British territory of Kowloon, on the mainland, opposite Hong Kong. With Kowloon and the remainder of the province of Kwantung in the hands of the enemy the safety of Hong Kong will be imperilled.

Opinion of an U. S. Officer.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—One of the highest officers of the army, who for obvious reasons did not want his name published, said today: "The serious thing about the Tien Tsin battle is that allied forces have made the same discovery that the British did in the conflict with the Boers: they find they have underrated the enemy. This will be the most serious general war since the days of Napoleon, and one into which the United States is bound to be drawn, if the atrocious treatment of the American minister and the other Americans be confirmed. Not to avenge their deaths would be to humiliate us in the sight of the whole world, civilized and barbarous. Although we all expect to be ordered to China, I candidly regard such a command as equivalent to a death warrant. It will be a war against such frightful odds that the hope of complete victory over the Chinese is based upon no tangible date."

Invalidated Canadians.

MONTREAL, July 17.—The Star's London cable says: Thirty invalidated Canadians from South Africa are now in London on furlough, staying at soldiers' rests and homes near Buckingham Palace.

Another Steamship Line.

Boston, July 18.—The rush to the country and the seaside continues. The provinces are receiving a good share of the tourist travel, but Nova Scotia seems to have a big advantage this year because of the foolish policy of the two Yarmouth lines in cutting rates. To be sure, the rate war will aid Nova Scotia hotel men, but it is manifestly unfair to the other provincial steamship companies, which, while handling all the business they can take care of at the present time, will likely suffer to some extent by it later in the season unless the D. A. R. and Yarmouth company patch up their differences. There is some talk in Portland of establishing a line of sterners between that port and Yarmouth. British Vice-Consul John E. Keating has long advocated such a line, and it is said that next season the projected enterprise will be an accomplished fact. The distance is 170 miles, and it is suggested that a twin screw boat could make the run easily one way between breakfast and supper. The fare one way, it is proposed, should be about \$1.50.

—The story is told of the late Bishop Simpson, of the M. E. church, that one occasion entering the home of Aunt Martha, George Washington's colored servant, he found her enjoying a smoke. Throwing up his hands in horror and in tone of mock surprise, he exclaimed:—

"Aunt Martha! and do you think they will admit you to heaven with the smell of tobacco on your breath?"

The faithful old negress was quite equal to the occasion. She very coolly replied:—

"Bless your soul, dear bishop, when I dies I 'specs to leave my bref behind!"

—In the course of a leading article on the massacre at Peking the Cologne Gazette says: "A certain Chinese element, if not the Chinese Government, or Chinese people, has forced war upon us, and it was shown in the Peking massacre what form this war must take. All Western civilization must now arm for vengeance. The Chinese must be treated as cannibals, and Peking razed to the ground. Then the Chinese must be compelled to rebuild it as a free city, according to the precepts of Western civilization. Now is the time when the vitality of two civilizations must be put to the final test, and the nations of the West must emerge victorious, be the sacrifice what it may."

—General Y. Fukushima, who is in command of the forces which Japan has already landed at Taku, is a distinguished soldier, traveller and scholar. During his junior years in the army he travelled on horseback from Berlin to Vladivostok clear across Siberia. He later visited Persia, touring the country thoroughly. The general is an excellent linguist. He speaks French, German and Russian fluently. He has travelled India, spent some time in Burmah, is familiar with the topography of Northern China, and has travelled much over the region which lies between the Gulf of Pe-Chi-li and the Amur. He fought in the Formosa campaign in 1874, against the Sasuma rebels in 1877, and against the Chinese in Corea and Manchuria. He is just 51 years old.

—The temperance workers of Ontario in convention have recorded their deep disappointment at the action of the Dominion Government in refusing to enact a prohibitory measure for the whole Dominion.

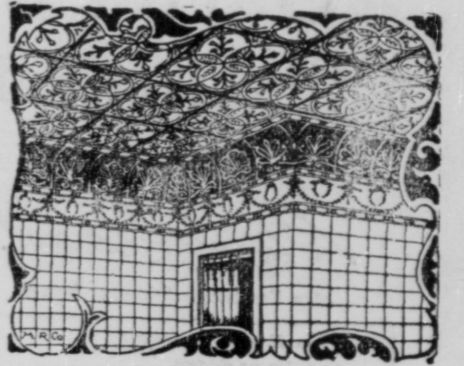
