

FINLEY PROTESTS

BOSTON (AP)—American League clubowners reaffirmed the sale of 90 per cent of New York Yankees to the Columbia Broadcasting System Wednesday.

The vote was 8-2, identical with the original telephonic vote of 8-2 on Oct. 13.

The specially-called meeting requested to review the deal lasted 7 1/2 hours. The tip-off came when Dr. Frank Stanton, president of CBS, was called back into the meeting almost immediately after it had gone into executive session.

League President Joe Cronin said and Arthur Allyn, president of Chicago White Sox, immediately walked out of the Yankees to the Columbia Broadcasting System Wednesday.

Charles O. Finley, Kansas City owner and president of the club, was the first to emerge from the meeting. He announced the 8-2 vote and said Allyn had introduced a resolution to delay the decision but his motion for delay was defeated.

Allyn, as he had previously, cast the other negative vote. His motion for delay of the vote came in the form of a request to "employ outside counsel."
