Blew Her All to Pieces.

DISASTROUS ATTEMPT TO DESTROY CHILIAN NEERL WARSHIPS.

Advice from San Francisco state that the ironclad Blanco, belonging to the insurgents, recently attempted to blow up the armed government tug Florence with a fish torpedo. The torpedo missed the tug but struck a big floating dry dock in the harbor, blowing it to pieces. The Blanco was thereupon treated to a hot fire of shot and shell from every gun in the forts and steamed out of the harbor. The same night a torpedo boat and the tug Florence stole out to attack the Blanco. The ironclad was in company with the sloop-of-war O'Higgins. Both ships compelled the Government vessels to return to the harbor and followed in hot pursuit.

A heavy shell from the Blanco struck the Florence, blowing her out of the water, and every one of her crew of seventeen men was either killed or wounded. A broadside from the O'Higgins knocked the torpedo boat all to pieces. The two insurgents then turned their attention to the forts and a lively battle ensued. A shell from the forts struck the O'Higgins and went clean through her. Another shell caused a gun on her quarter-deck to explode. The deck was literally torn out of the vessel and nine men out of the gun's crew of twelve were blown to atoms. The sloop was at once taken out of danger of the guns in the fort.

Young Men.

Generally speaking, the thought of his responsibility is not the uppermost one in a young man's mind as he plunges into the bustle and excitement of an active life. Fame, wealth, personal appearance, how he can best enjoy himself—these and the like are the thoughts which fill his mind, and inspire him with motive power. He looks upon the present, with all its richly-tinted clusters of sensuous pleasures, as free to his hand, and which he has a perfect right to seize and drain into his cup. Of the remote influence of his action, either upon himself or others, he rarely if ever thinks. He forgets, or does not wish to remember, the effect of his conduct and example for good or evil upon the community; but such thoughtlessness, such forgetfulness of moral obligation, is cognizable by justice. God never framed one law of responsibility for the old and another for the young; and never are men so responsible, never are they so worthy or unworthy, never so royally justified or so fearfully condemned, as when their brains are the best, their bodies the strongest, and the current of their life at its fullest flood and flow.

How to Take Life.

Take life like a man. Take it just as though it was—as it is—an earnest, vital, essential affair. Take it just as though you personally were born to the task of performing a merry part in it—as though the world had waited for your coming. Take it as though it was a grand opportunity to do and to achieve, to carry forward great and good schemes; to help and cheer a suffering, weary, it may be heartbroken, brother. The fact is, life is undervalued by a great majority of mankind. It is not made half as much of as should be the case. Where is the man, or woman, who accomplishes one tithe of what might be done? Who cannot look back upon opportunities lost, plans, unachieved, thoughts crushed, aspirations unfulfilled, and all caused from the lack of the necessary and possible effort! If we knew better how to take and make the most of life, it would be far greater than it is. Now and then a man stands aside from the crowd, labors earnestly, steadfastly, confidently, and straightway becomes famous for wisdom, intellect, skill, greatness of some sort. The world wonders, admires, idolizes; and yet it only illustrates what each may do if he takes hold of life with a purpose. If a man but say he will, and follows it up, there is nothing in reason he may not expect to accomplish. There is no magic, no miracle, no secret to him who is brave in heart and determined in spirit.

Will That War-Cloud Grow?

RUSSIA'S MOVEMENTS CAUSING UNEASINESS IN EUROPE.

An uneasy feeling prevails throughout Germany that the massing of troops on the Austrian frontier, the bestowal of the Order of St. Andrew on President Carnot and the resumption of Russian intrigues in the Balkan Peninsula are symptoms which, taken in connection with each other, amount to a Russian demonstration of hostility to the German Empire. The Berlin Bourne is sensibly affected by the prevalence of this feeling.

Prince Ferdinand's commission as Governor of Roumelia expires on April 5, when Turkey can refuse to reappoint him, but is not likely to do so while Stambulof is premier. This probably explains the attempt on the latter's life, as his death would have enabled Russia to interfere.

It is reported that a note has been issued by M. de Giers, the Russian Minister of State for Foreign Affairs, forerunning the intention of Russia to intervene in the Balkans. This circumstance, says the Gazette, combined with the demonstrative massing of Russian troops on the frontier, is looked upon as a sign of the approach of critical days in Eastern Europe.

The Pesther Lloyd says: "We stand at the beginning of another great movement on the part of Russia, which will probably open with a protest against the reappointment of Ferdinand as Governor of Roumelia. It is time that the dread should consider how long it will continue to allow Russia to make military preparations."

A WEALTHY AUSTRIAN NOBLEMAN PURCHASES A WOMAN'S CLAIM UPON HIS SON.

It was currently reported in New York last week that Count Pista Karolyi, of Buda Pesth, one of the most distinguished noblemen of Austria, had, through a Boston agency, paid \$5,000 to the young woman with whom his son eloped last winter, and that she had signed a paper releasing young Karolyi, to whom she had been married in California, from all claims against him. It was also said that the Count had taken his departure for Austria, accompanied by his son. The Count was formerly the Austro-Hungarian Ambassador to England and recognized as the leading statesman of Austria. The young man's name is given in the German peerage as Count George Karolyi. A cable despatch published Jan. 24 last from Buda Pesth, stated that young Karolyi was then in Boston, from which place he had written to the Count that, having no hope of reconciliation or pardon for his escapade, he had decided to remain permanently in this country and become a citizen of the United States. The young man's wife was an actress named Boriska Frank, nineteen years old. The wedding was solemnized by Father Kirk, of the Roman Catholic Church at Oakland, Cal.

News Notes.

Lord Rosebery succeeds Earl Granville, deceased, as Liberal leader in the House of Lords.

The militia force of Jamaica will be increased to 1,500 men and service made compulsory.

The Cologne Gazette says the Bulgarian Government has made a contract for large supplies of war material with which to strengthen the Bulgarian defences.

A physician of Rochester, N. Y., has sent \$500 in small sums to about fifty citizens of Springfield, O., to pay for chickens, melons, etc., that he appropriated in his boyhood days.

A young woman at Hammon, N. J., was married last week to a man from California whom she had never seen till the day of the wedding. The courtship, based on an advertisement, was carried on by letter.

It is asserted by the leaders of the mob at New Orleans that if indictments are found against them for the part they took in the affair, 2,000 persons who participated in it with them would march to the court and surrender themselves as equally guilty.

"The farmers of Nebraska are having a hard race with their mortgages, but the mortgages keep three laps ahead without half trying." This is not the view of a "Tory organ." It is the deliberate opinion of the New York Herald, expressed in its issue of Monday last.

A distemper which has recently appeared among the peasants of the Russian province of Krasn is attributed by the medical authorities to the "bread of poverty" which the famished population eat. For want of rye, wheat or potatoes they bake bread of acorns, which produces colic, swelling of the limbs and distension of the abdomen. The disease is fatal in many cases.

HAS TWO TAILS.—A cat with two tails is the latest freak of nature reported in Nova Scotia.

EARLY.—A bunch of heather and May-flowers was picked at Chester, N. S., on the 29th March.

WANT HIM REMOVED.—A recent despatch from Augusta, Me., says: The House this morning voted to join the Senate in an address to the Governor and Council for the removal of Judge Hamilton of Biddeford municipal court, for habits of intoxication and immorality.
