HANLAN's eyes are almost closed with iritis. They continue to suppurate, causing both discomfort and pain.

THE Ross Smith race has again been postponed—this time until the weather is fit for sailing. Ten thousand people disappointed.

THE Marriage of King Alfonso of Spain is announced to take place at Madrid at the expiration of the period of mourning for the Infanta Maria del Pinar.

THE brigantine *Peers* arrived at Canso from Liverpool, G. B., on Tuesday last. The Captain reports heavy weather and the loss of one man named Rober Robertson, of Liverpool, during the passage.

PERSONALS.—Hon. McKenzie Bowell and family returned to Ottawa on Tuesday morning.

T. C. James and F. W. Hales, Esqs., returned from St. John on Tuesday, where they had been attending the Y. M. C. A. Convention.

CITY SCHOOLS.—There is a great deal of complaint about the overcrowded state of some of the city schools. It is said that Miss McLeod is endeavoring to teach 130 children. This is an injustice to teacher and pupil, and we hope that something will be done to remedy the evil.

AT THE Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, Mary McEachran and Catherine Campbell appeared on a charge of larceny on complaint of Timothy O'Connell. The evidence being insufficient, the prisoners were discharged. Richard Duffy was arraigned for assaulting George Marquis, but the summons was dismissed with costs.

THE ARCTIC SEARCH EXPEDITION which started last summer to discover the journals of Sir John Franklin's expedition has been heard from. They landed on the north shore of Hudson Bay in August, 1878, and in April of this year made a journey towards King William's Land. Several geographical errors had been made by the Expedition.

"GRIP'S" CARTOON.—Grip's last cartoon is entitled, "Sir John's Crowning Victory." It represents Sir John taking the oath of Privy Councillor before the Queen. While in the act of kissing the Bible, he is represented as giving George Brown, the editor of the *Globe* (who is standing behind him with a mop and pail), a kick in the stomach.

MR. NEWTON L. MCKAY is the Grit candidate for the vacancy caused by the death of the late member for Cape Breton. He is a genuine Reformer and Free Trader of the advanced school. He opposes the Government because they did not put a duty of seventy-five cents a ton on coal, instead of fifty cents. This seems inconsistent, but it is characteristic of your true Grit.

WE regret to learn that our respected fellow-citizen, Mr. Francis McKory, met with a serious accident at Miscouche on Wednesday. Mr. McKory was engaged at painting the R. C. Chapel. The stage on which he was working gave way, and he fell to the ground, breaking one of his legs above the ankle. The limb was immediately set, and Mr. McKory is now doing well.

GEORGE A. STANLEY, shoemaker, was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court to-day, charged with stealing a purse from the pocket of Mr. James C. McMillan, of Halifax. Six witnesses were examined, and the evidence showed that Mr. McMillan's purse—containing a return ticket to Halifax, and three of McMillan's visiting cards were found in Stanley's workshop, and that he had been expending money very freely yesterday. Stanley was fully committed for trial at the next session of the Supreme Court, for larceny.

HOBOKEN, New York, has its Guibord Case. The authorities of Calvary cemetery have refused to permit the body of Dennis Copper to be interred in a lot which had been purchased by the deceased during his life time. Copper was a Roman Catholic, but had become a Freemason. The funeral procession was allowed to go to the cemetery gate before the fact of the refusal was made known. The Roman Catholic authorities boldly take the ground that the exclusion of Copper's remains from the Cemetery was that he had violated the regulations of the Church by belonging to a secret society; and hence that his body was not entitled to be buried in consecrated ground. Legal proceedings have been instituted, similar to those which took place in the celebrated Guibord case, and the contest promises to be equally bitter.

A LARGE number of people gathered at the Summerside Driving Park, on Tuesday afternoon to witness the match race between "Look Out" and "Dean Swift," for \$50 a side. "Dean Swift" failed to put in an appearance. The absence of this horse, whatever may be the cause of it, brought unfavorable comments on his owner. In spite of the absence of one of the horses that was advertised to trot, a race was got up between Mr. Newton Lea's stallion "All Right" and "Look Out." "All Right" was in no condition to trot, and his owner had no intention of trotting him when he left home. He consented simply to prevent the large crowd that assembled to witness the race from going away disappointed. The race was mile heats, best three in five. "All Right" won the race in three straight heats. This fine animal bids fare to become one of the fastest trotters in America.

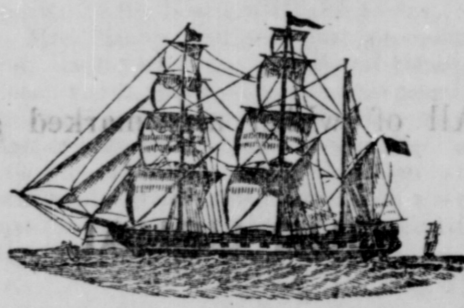
