SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—John McMillan, while suffering from one of the fits to which he is subject, walked through the window of his bedroom in the upper story of Stevenson's building on Queen Street this morning about half past four, falling with a thud to the sidewalk below. The City of New York Aground.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. The steamship City of New York is aground, and it is feared she is sinking in the quicksand. The company have despatched tugs to take the passengers off.

HALIFAX, Oct. 10.

A cablegram Rev. D. M. Gordon announces his arrival in Hong Kong. Word has been received of the death of Mrs. Robertson, wife of Rev. H. A. Robertson, missionary to the New Hebrides.

Charles G. Murray, son of Lt.-Col. J. R. Murray, a graduate of the Royal Military College, Kingston, left for Malta to-day, where he will be attached to the Connaught Rangers, in which regiment he has received a commission.

Hon. E. R. Oaks, M. P. for Digby, is dead, aged 73 years. He was a member of the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia.

A Tour of Inspection.

QUEBEC, Oct. 10.

The American mining engineers, accompanied by Premier Mercier and other provincial members, the Mayor and members of the City Council, members of Parliament and legislature, the press, etc., went around the harbor to-day in the steamer Vega, visiting the harbor works, graving dock and the scene of the late land-slide.

The Convention Signed.

ROME, Sept. 10.

The convention between Russia and the Vatican has been signed by Isvolski, the Russian representative, and Cardinal Rampella, the Papal Secretary of State. In accordance with this convention the Propaganda appoints five Russian bishops.

Application was made to-day to the Railway Committee of the Privy Council, for leave to construct terminal facilities for the Chignecto ship railway at Laplache. The matter was referred to the Railway Department for a report.

OTTAWA, Oct. 10.

Hon. Mr. Dewdney states that from the most reliable authorities in the Northwest, he is informed that Manitoba and the Territories will export from ten to twelve million bushels this season.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10.

Mr. Laurier says he will give his opinion soon as to the duration and consequences of the anti-Jesuit agitation in Ontario.
