"Girls tell lads they won't go out with them anymore if their good looks get spoiled in the ring and the young fools give up boxing," he said.

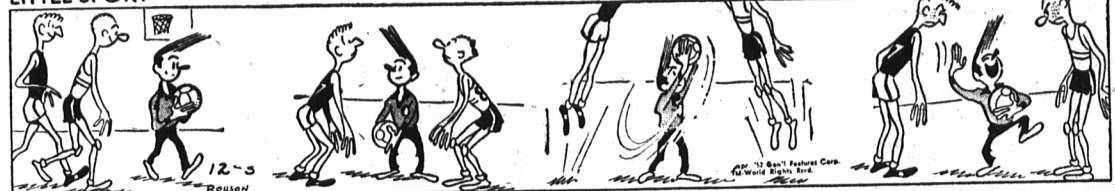

In a prepared speech to the annual general meeting of the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association, Lord Rosebery, president, said breeders were not on the right line in catering to the public demand for short-running, quick-maturing horses.

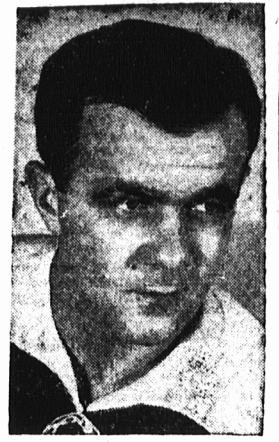
Lord Rosebery is one of Britain's top breeders and owners, and is a member of the Jockey Club, the ruling body of horse racing.

"Economic conditions," said Lord Rosebery, "are responsible for the present breeding trend. It costs so much to train a horse these days that owners cannot afford to face the fact that a yearling they buy may not be ready to win a race until it is three years old."
