INSURANCE OF THE CONTINGENT.

"Twenty-one claims have been paid by the Ocean Accident & Guarantee Company of London, to the next of kin or legal heirs of Canadian soldiers killed in action in South Africa. The insurance was effected through Sir Charles Tupper after an identical proposition made by the company had been turned down by the Laurier Government. There are one or two outstanding claims, fully proved, which we are ready to pay as soon as we can ascertain who is legally entitled to the money."

This statement was made by an officer of the company.

Since the beginning of the campaign statements have been made by spell-binders in the Liberal ranks that the accident insurance placed through Sir Charles Tupper on the men from Canada who went to South Africa to defend the flag of the Empire was, as they termed it, "a big bluff." This was followed up by equally baseless charges that if there was such a scheme in existence the heirs or dependents of the brave boys who gave up their lives on the field of battle would never receive a cent of insurance. Enquiry at the offices in Toronto brought out the statement quoted in the opening paragraph. This was supplemented by a list, showing the names of the persons insured. Each claim was paid in full, as is evidenced by the receipts. The list follows:

Some time ago an official statement was sent out from Ottawa to the effect that the Government intended to take out some "real insurance" on the lives of the men at the front, but this was not realized; in fact so far as can be learned, nothing further was done in the matter.

"The insurance placed on the soldiers through Sir Charles," said an official, "covers as it was understood from the very outset, only cases where the person is killed in action or dies within a certain time after receiving the wound. It is accident insurance pure and simple. Nothing more was asked for or intended when the policy was written. Why it should be otherwise construed or misrepresented, as has been the case within the last four or five weeks I am at a loss to understand.

"That the services of Sir Charles form a peculiarly happy contrast with the promises broken and otherwise of the Government is evidenced by the number of letters received at the company's office, in which there are eloquent expressions of gratitude to the man who did what he started out to do and did that well."
