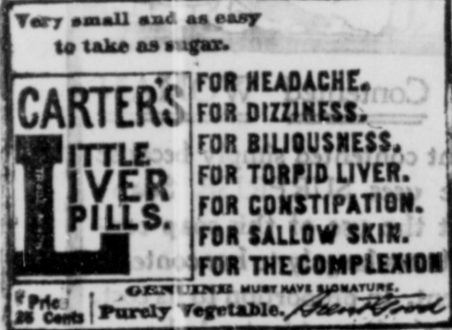

THUMPING BIG EXPENDITURES.

A GREAT DEAL of attention—not unmixed with alarm—has been created by the publication of the details of the Government's expenditures, as estimated for next year. These amounts to the enormous sum of \$56,312,527.99, or ten dollars per head of the population of the country.

It was thought that the Government's original estimate of \$49,068,391, would not have been greatly exceeded. When the Government in addition to this immense amount demanded grants to the extent of \$7,244,125 the people were amazed. What will the old-time Liberals, who were taught to grumble at the Conservatives' expenditures of \$36,000,000 and \$38,000,000, think of expenditures amounting to \$18,000,000 or \$20,000,000 more? Can we suppose that the independent farmers of this Province would have voted for Sir Louis Davies and his followers if they had supposed that, under Liberal rule, the Government expenditures would in four short years have risen to \$56,312,527?

TRADE WITH TRINIDAD.

The Rev. Dr. Morton, of Trinidad, addressed a meeting of the business men of Truro on Monday evening on the advantage of closer trade relations between Canada and Trinidad. According to a report of a gentleman who was present, Dr. Morton referred to the increasing population, products and prosperity of the island and stated that it could send to Canada sugar, cocoa, tropical fruits, asphalt, etc., while the people there need lumber, potatoes, flour, butter, cheese and condensed milk. All of these things are produced in Canada, most of them in P. E. Island. We are informed that the McIntyre potato grown here is well suited to the Trinidad market. Cheese and butter find ready sale, but cheese should be in small packages—much smaller than those made for the British market—and butter in one pound cans. P. E. Island oats are esteemed in Trinidad. From the Provincial point of view as well, as that of Canada at large we sincerely trust that the negotiations now pending between the Governments of Canada and Trinidad will be successful.

Here is a table showing the amount of nutriment in various kinds of food and the value of the food:

If the troops had been given pea flour at five cents per pound there would have been three times as much nutriment in each tin as there is in a tin of emergency rations at two dollars a pound.—Mail and Empire.

A LETTER FROM COUNCILLOR TANTON.

Sir,—Your correspondent "Improvement" asserts that in the City Council discussion, on the dust nuisance, no one proposed a way out of the difficulty. It is not my custom to introduce problems to the Council without offering the solution, which I did in the form of a resolution requiring the extra watering cart to be put into service and to keep, both carts employed both earlier and later in the day. To this Councillor Wheat moved an amendment which apparently did not alter the intention of my resolution but in reality left an opening for the inner circle to balk its usefulness. Under this subterfuge they will screen their inaction while dust clouds run rampant, holding unchecked away.

"Improvement" is right on the question of street services and in accord with what I have vigorously advocated in the Council. Anything in the line of an outside appropriation is taken hold of promptly, and generously complied with; but when we have the temerity to ask the smallest sum for street work or city improvement the whine of poverty is almost pitiable to listen to.

CONTEST IN THE WEST RIVER DISTRICT.

Sir,—The political contest now on in the West River District gives an opportunity to the electors of that district to make by their votes on the 11th July next a declaration. They are not at this time called upon to decide between Liberal and Conservative rule, but they are called upon to take their stand on a very much more serious question, namely, that of maintaining the principles of constitutional government, the people's right to rule which we are supposed to enjoy under the British flag, on the one hand; and that right abused, trampled upon and disregarded as it has been by the government, that at the present time has control of the affairs of this province on the other hand.

If it were merely a question between Liberal and Conservative governments it might not be so vastly important to set aside our party prejudices as it is at this particular time when so important a question as the peoples rights and liberties are at stake. We may appeal to all fair-minded electors, no matter by what name we are called, if it is not one of our cherished and dearly bought rights that the people must rule, and that by expressing themselves freely at the polls; and this being so we are called upon at this time to stand shoulder to shoulder and recent any attempts to infringe upon or deny us of our rights which come to us by the British constitution and responsible government no matter by what individual or government attempts may be made to thwart us in the exercise of those rights.

Let us view briefly the political history of this province for the past twelve months and see whether our constitutional rights have been regarded and are being carried out. Less than a year ago the electors of Tignish elected a representative to oppose the Barquharson administration. What do we find a little later? That in the moment of weakness and need on the part of the Government, and in the moment of need and weakness on the part of the representative, the latter deserts his supporters and traitorously supports those whom he was elected to oppose! Is this in keeping with the principles of responsible government? Are we going to

sanction the gross betrayal of the people's rights?

These, seen in the month of December last, the government, after having appointed an Attorney General in the person of Mr D. A. McKinnon, sent him to his old district, Murray Harbor, for the people's approval. They also at the same time, appealed to the electors of Belfast, and these two districts gave the government their answer. They expressed their disapproval of the appointment as well as the general management of our public affairs, but notwithstanding the people's answer the government snapp their fingers in the face of the electors, and say by their action: "We will do as we like in spite of what you electors say; you disapprove of our actions, but we have no regard for your opinion; we will take our own course; we will retain our Attorney General, even though you reject

him." Is this in line with the constitutional rights of a free people?

The eyes of all fair minded electors throughout this province at this particular time are looking to the electors of the West River district with a confident hope that they will give, in unmistakable terms, a strong expression resenting such abuses to our rights as now obtains in this our Island province, and as independent electors show that they are bound that they must regard the rights and privileges we have have a right to enjoy under the benign folds of the Union Jack.

In reference to the late representative of the West River District it is not necessary to say much. He is well and favorably known by all the electors in the District, and the manner in which he was elected and betrayed by his former leader should be condemned by every elector who is a lover of honor and fair play.

We hope the electors will consider well the welfare of their district and with a true regard for the good government of our province will strongly condemn the wrong and stand by the right.
