The Saint Dunstan's Junior Varsity trimmed the P. W. C. Jayvees by a 5-1-2 count in an exhibition game played at the Forum yesterday afternoon. The taller Hillmen played superior ball throughout the encounter though they showed a lack of finish under the basket.

The Saints jumped to an early lead and were never headed in the somewhat loosely played game. They held a 22-15 edge at the half and increased their margin by 15 in the second frame, outscoring the Welsh 29-14.

Both teams, though they lacked polish, made an interesting game of it all the way. The Hillmen were very fast and played good defensive ball, ball-hawking all over the court and intercepting many Wales' passes. In the second half the Red-and-Whites held the Tricolour squad scoreless for 12 minutes, until Hilson Carr hit on a long push shot from outside the keyhole.

The Saints were sparked by speedy Arnold Murphy with 20 points and the rebounding of big "Coopy" Callaghan. Every man on the S. D. U. team entered the scoring column.

The Welsh attack was paced by Scantlebury and MacDougall with 8 each. Fourteen fouls were called against the Welshmen and twelve against the Saints.

S'ide Lady Curlers Win Provincial Title

Summerside lady curlers yesterday won the C.E. Crockett Trophy emblematic of the Provincial Championship in competition with rinks from Charlottetown and Alberton at the western capital.

In a morning round the Anna Hayes skipped rink from Summerside defeated an Alberton rink skipped by Margaret Perry 14-4. In an afternoon match a Charlottetown rink skipped by Mary MacLennan downed the Perry rink from Alberton 8-5.

In the final match the Summerside rink scored a 6-3 victory over

Charlottetown to clinch the title and the beautiful trophy.

Three rinks from the Charlottetown Club and one from Alberton played a series of exhibition matches during the day. It was the first major competition which saw lady curlers from all three Island clubs represented. A very pleasant time was had, and the visitors were loud in their praise of the hospitality extended by the home club.

Members of the Summerside championship rink are: Shirley Simpson, lead, Velma Holman, 2nd stone, Marion Smallman, mate, and Anna Hayes, skip.

Sport Echoes From Prince County

The Summerside Crystals have been the butts of a lot of good-natured kidding since earlier in the winter when they were beaten by a rather surprising 7 to 0 score. They took this ribbing in their stride and bided their time, which was last Tuesday night. The Crystals turned the tables on the kids in the second game doing a white-wash in their turn, but not laying it on quite so thick. Four goals to nil was their answer to all the fans who had given them the business.

Of course, the series is not over. The Schurman-coached juveniles in junior clothing are vowing that they will get back into the picture and hand the Crystals another defeat before the sun beats too strong a tattoo on the roof of the Crystal rink. They may do it. The game was close enough Tuesday night to risk a little change on the kids to take at least one game from the East Prince champs. Of course the S and M boys are also East Prince champs in their own division.

Lippy Gaudet's bantams are also East Prince champs, so you can see Summerside is simply cluttered up with that particular type of animal. Whether they'll get an Island champion or not is another question. If we don't, it will be the first time Summerside didn't turn the trick in quite a number of years. The Crystals and juniors have, of course, been eliminated but we still have the micmacs, bantams and paperweights fighting to bring to Summerside an Island crown. Of the three the bantams are probably the best bet to turn the trick. (According to Lippy it isn't even a gamble).

The Lennox Island Micmacs finally eliminated Lot 16 from the Intermediate "C" playdowns after a hard fight. The Micmacs won the first 4 to 3, dropped the second 2 to 1 after two periods of overtime, and won the third 3 to 0. The Micmacs have come a long way since last winter. They were beaten very easily in the winter of 1949-50. On the line-up is that fine athlete, Louie Mitchell, who made such a good impression in a utility role with the Curran and Belgis Maritime champion baseball team.

Turning to baseball, it seems pretty definite that J. K. Curran will not sponsor a team this year. Reliable information has it that last year's Maritime champs, both intermediate and junior, will be disbanded. This will mean that the baseball diamond adjacent to the High School will probably be once more the centre of attraction to baseball fans this coming summer. No doubt the Town League will be re-organized and an All-Star team picked to compete for Maritime honors as was the custom three years ago.

Fans generally will be sorry to see J. K. fade from the baseball picture. Besides backing his teams to the limit financially, he was a colorful figure back of home plate imploring his batters to hit the ball "over the mill."

Canadians Win

PARIS, March 15—(Reuters)—Canada overwhelmed the United States 16-2 in the world hockey championships tonight to move into second place in group "A"—one point behind Sweden, out with one game in hand.

The Americans remained in fifth place.

Forum Ice Gets Face-Lift

The Charlottetown Forum's ice surface underwent a complete face-lifting during yesterday, when for the first time in its history a rotary ice planer was used to trim down the surface to a mirror-like smoothness.

The machine is the property of the Summerside Curling Club, but was loaned to the Forum management to trim down the ice to a thickness of about 1 1/2 inches to facilitate quicker and even flooding for a better surface for the forthcoming Maritime Major Hockey League finals, scheduled to get underway here on Saturday.

Islanders star left winger, Walter Pawlyshyn, who has had considerable experience with ice planing machines, operated the machine and was whipping off ice of a 1/4 inch thickness at a time while many interested spectators looked on.

The machine can be set to take off the thickness of ice required, and is powered by a five horsepower motor and the five rotary cutters, with six cutting blades each, revolves at the rate of 1,800 revolutions per minute. The machine will skim off about one yard of ice at a time, and moves at the rate of a fast walk.

East Nicholson's hot and cold Welshmen blew slightly more than tepid yesterday afternoon when they made it two in a row over the Saints from S. D. U. in their scheduled Physical Fitness Basketball League encounter. The Tricolour squad never played better ball in trimming the Red-and-Whites 69-49, the worst beating that the Saints have been handed this year.

St. Dunstan's opened the scoring and went to a five-point lead which they held for several minutes. Then the Welsh caught fire. Sparked by guards Crockett and Ashford, who played standout ball throughout the game, they checked an shot after shot, gaining a lead that they did not relinquish for the rest of the battle. The Welsh outscored the Hillmen by 23 points in the initial stanza, 37-15. Margin of victory was provided by the city collegians' vastly superior shooting. The Welshmen hit on 16 of their 36 floor attempts for a 44 per cent while the Saints were potting only 4 of their 35 tries, 11 per cent of their field shots.

The second stanza showed a much more even type of play. The Hillmen fought back desperately, and succeeded in more than holding their own, though they could do little to whittle down the impressive Welsh margin. Jack Reardon, held to a single mark in the first half, came to life in the second half, to attack with 18 points. The Tricolour squad were led in the second canto by smooth-working Charlie Hine who scored on all of his six shots from the floor and added a free toss for a like 13-point performance. P. W. C. dunked 43 per cent of their shots in the frame while S. D. U. swished a much improved 34 per cent. The Hillmen outscored the Welsh in the frame 34-32.

Hero of the piece was red-hot Charlie Hine with a top 20-point performance. Ashford and Crockett rebounded and blocked well and scored 16 and 21 respectively. High man in a losing cause was Jack Reardon, who, though marked closely by Welshmen Hood and Hine, nevertheless hit for 14 points. Fred Coyle played excellent ball and scored 12 more.

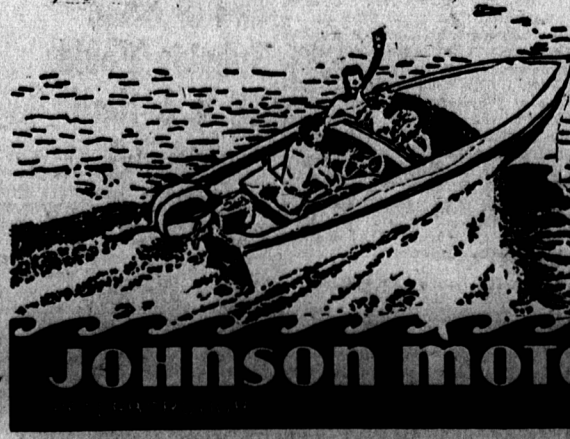

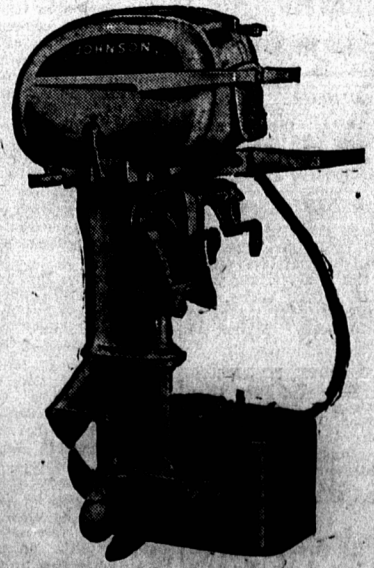
