

Inspiring Ceremony Held As War Memorial Unveiled

An inspiring unveiling and dedication ceremony was witnessed by a large attendance at Memorial Square, Summerside yesterday when Mr. J. Watson MacNaught unveiled a memorial to 62 fallen comrades from the Summerside area who gave their lives in World War Two and the Korean conflict. Major G. L. Monkley, president of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion presided.

Major W. A. Currie, during the course of his address prior to the unveiling said "On an occasion such as this, one cannot but be conscious of his inadequacy to express in words the feeling of his fellow citizens. It is my honor and privilege today to give voice, on behalf of all the citizens, to their feelings of homage and gratitude on the occasion of the unveiling of this tablet on which is inscribed the names of those brave boys who went forth to battle and gave their lives in his cause of freedom. It is fitting that this unveiling is taking place on the anniversary of V-E day which marked the end of the European sector of World War Two.

"Many of the boys whose names are inscribed on this tablet, about to be unveiled, have a father, mother, wives, sisters, brothers or perhaps just former friends here in this audience or among those listening in and what can we say that will be any comfort to them beyond expressing our homage and gratitude. We want to honor their sacrifice and memory. But how can we best do it? These dead are not honored by the mere placing of a plaque unless it is a true symbol of the intentions of the living to honor them by devotion to the justice and freedom for which they gave their lives. In some ways it is a harder thing to devote one's living to these ends, than to give life, for it means daily determination to shun all that is harmful to life. The sheer demands of such a course of action over a sustained period are heavy. But it is to these ends that we must commit ourselves if we really mean anything on such an occasion as this. Yes, this will require strength, strength of character and strength of will and we will not find it all within ourselves or draw it from those around us but from on high and it will behoove all of us to re-examine our position and re-check our course through life if we are to be worthy of the sacrifice these boys made on behalf of us and the following generations.

"I think words of Daniel Webster provide an appropriate closing thought: 'If we work upon granite, it will perish. If we work upon brass, time will efface it. If we rear temples, they will crumble to dust. But if we work upon human minds, if we will imbue them with high principles, with the just fear of God and love of their fellow creatures, we engrave on those tablets something which no time can efface, and which will brighten to all eternity.'

Rev. J. E. LeClair delivered the prayer of dedication and concluded with the words "as we dedicate this memorial, may we pray for a lasting peace, so that their sacrifice may not have been in vain." Following the prayer of dedication a wreath was placed on the memorial by Mayor Currie and during the laying of poppies by the veterans, Major Monkley read the 62 names that are inscribed on the memorial, all but one of whom lost their lives in World War Two.
