Archduke Charles Louis, brother of the Emperor of Austria, is dying, and has received the last rites of the Church.

Owing to the block of Government business in the Imperial House of Commons, it is almost certain that an autumn session will be called.

Mr. Cecil Rhodes has telegraphed to Cape Town saying that if he effects a junction with Capt. Napier the Matabelle rebellion will be broken.

A despatch from Vladivostok says that quiet has been restored at Seoul, and that the King of Korea will return to his palace from the Russian Legation.

A German military court has sentenced Count von Kotze to two years' imprisonment in a fortress as a punishment for his duel with Baron von Schell, which resulted in the death of the latter.

Violent gales have prevailed along all the British coast, and the shipping at Hull has suffered considerably. A large vessel was driven ashore near Port Patrick, Scotland, on Wednesday. It is feared there has been a great loss of life.

A cyclone passed over the town of Reska, 20 miles south of Wichita, Kan., on Tuesday afternoon, but as communication is cut off with that place no details can be ascertained.

The Sultan has not yet recovered from the fright induced by the news of the assassination of the Shah of Persia. The arrests, which began almost immediately upon the receipt of the intelligence, have continued during the past two weeks.

Details received in regard to anti-missionary riots at Kiang Yin on May 17, during which a mission was looted, show that the disturbance was caused by the admission of a native child to the hospital.
