Oil Production
In Alberta Up

—EDMONTON, (CP)—Crude oil
production in Alberta for the first
three months of 1953 was up 3,-
702,638 barrels over the same pe-
riod in 1952, a record year.
The Petroleum and Natural Gas
Conservation Board, in its March
report, said Saturday that produc-
tion for the three-month period
totalled 14,207,079 barrels com-
pared with 10,503,441 for the same
1952 interval.
Eighty-eight more oil wells were
brought in during March compared
with 89 in the same period last
year. At the end of March this year
Alberta has 2,892 oil wells operat-
ing or capable of operations, and
increase of 952 in a year.

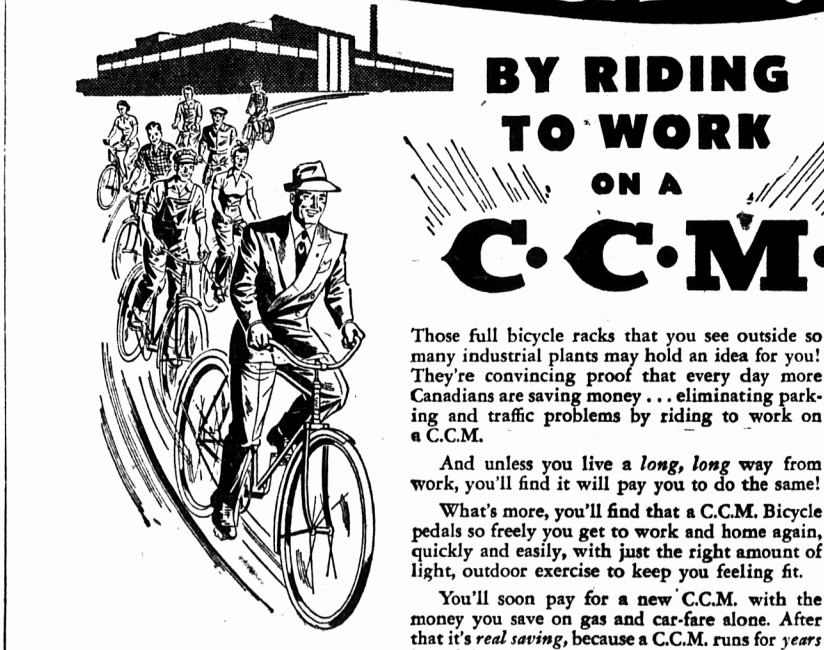
