Considerable has been said from time to time in this column about the hockey activities in the Island Intermediate "A" and Juvenile leagues etc., but for a change, we would like to make some mention of the Intermediate "B" competitions that have been going full swing for some time now.

Playing in the various rural rinks all over the Province before large, enthusiastic crowds of fans, sometimes totaling up to the six and seven hundred mark, and on occasions even more, the various teams and leagues have been coming up with smart hockey and are doing much to develop the game within the borders of this Province.

At the present time, mainly through the efforts of the Department of Physical Fitness, who have helped to organize the leagues and have donated a beautiful trophy for the final provincial winners, playoff competitions in county and sub-county play are going full tilt at the moment. Play is narrowing down every day towards the final inter-county finals to declare a Provincial champion for the right to meet the Intermediate "A" winners and decide a team to represent the Province in Maritime Intermediate Championship play.

All the playoff competitions in this group are of a home and home, total goal type of series, and there have been some close, rugged battles for top honors up to the present time. In Kings County play to date, the Murray Harbor Bruins are proving themselves to be the big team in that quarter, and have so far eliminated the Georgetown Eagles by a 21-7 total and are well on the way to putting the Montague Meteors out of the running by virtue of an 8-2 victory over them on Tuesday night in the series opener. However, they will still have to meet the winner of the Montague Meteors, the winner of the St. John's Peter's-Morell series for the Kings County title and the right to progress into inter-county playoffs.

Turning to the Western section of the Province, we find the Borden Nationals making an impressive showing in series play to date for the Prince County title. Pitting their strength against the Freeborn Royals, they have concluded the opening game of the schedule by sending the Royals down to a 9-7 defeat and scored a 13-2 victory on Tuesday night to take the series by a 22-9 count. But they have a way to go yet, as they still have to meet the winner of the O'Leary-Alberton-Kensington series, which we understand has been whittled down to between Alberton and Kensington which will be played this week.

Here in Queens County it has been a rugged battle so far. The North River All Stars have won their first part of the schedule in a nip-and-tuck series with Nine Mile Creek Bulldogs, the former winning the series by a narrow 9-8 margin in the two game series, taking the first game 6-5 and battling to a 3-3 tie at North River rink on Tuesday night. In the other sub-county division in Queens, the East Royals Royals have won the opening game of their series 12-3 and although they have another game to play, look very much like they will be the team to meet the North River All Stars in the County finals which get underway at North River on Monday night.

Of course there are still quite a few games to go before the final Island winner is decided, but at the present rapid pace the matches are being run off, it won't be long before the semi-finals and finals will be reached, any judging from the strong showings from the various centres, there are some rugged matches in store for hockey fans before it is over.

Although both the Intermediate "A" and Intermediate "B" group Island champs will meet one another for the right to compete in Maritime play, both will be playing for individual league trophies donated by the Department of Physical Fitness.

## Ken Reardon Fined \$1,000

MONTREAL, March 1 —(CP)—Ken Reardon of Montreal Canadiens has been fined \$1,000 because of statements attributed to him in a magazine article, the National Hockey League announced today.

In the article Reardon was quoted as threatening to see that Cal Gardner of Toronto Maple Leafs gets 14 stitches in his mouth — the same as Reardon received from Gardner as a result of an affair in a game a couple of seasons ago.

In announcing the fine, President Clarence Campbell at the same time said Reardon, at the end of his playing days in the N.H.L., can petition for a refund of the fine.

Campbell said the fine is not so much a penalty as a personal cash bond for Reardon's future good conduct.

He said what action would be taken on a future petition by Reardon depends entirely on the player's behavior meanwhile.

Campbell said Reardon acknowledged the statements attributed to him in the magazine (Sport) but felt satisfied Reardon's statement that his feud with Gardner is finished is sincere.
