RAILROAD ACCIDENT AT THE NIAGARA SUSPENSION BRIDGE. On Tuesday, as the Erie and Ontario train was on the curve bound for Niagara, a few hundred yards from the Bridge station, it met the Great Western train of cars from Hamilton, and a fearful crash followed, which resulted in the destruction of the two engines and four or five cars, and wounded more or less severely a large number of passengers on the Great Western train.
