

Liberal Financial Critic Levels Blast At PC Gov't

 OTTAWA (CP)—Liberal financial critic William Bendickson said Wednesday there seems to be "an unseemly and unholty competition" among federal, provincial and municipal governments for money these days.

Pinning most of the blame on the federal government, Mr. Bendickson said various levels of government are freely using the "gimmick" of selling bonds at a tax-deductible discount to lure money from investors. He said one recent federal issue offered a profit of 6.6 per cent to certain large investors.

The member for Kenora-Rainy River, Ont., said during a Commons interim supply debate that only a budget disclosing federal government intentions for the

next year will show whether the government "is concerned in a serious way about restraining inflation."

APPROVE SPENDING

Eventually, the House approved \$816,000,000 in government spending for April and May, first two months of the new fiscal year.

At some points in Mr. Bendickson's speech, Finance Minister Fleming interrupted to accuse him of making misleading and inaccurate statements about government bond yields.

In other Commons developments:

1. Members offered a thunderous ovation to Prime Minister Macmillan and Foreign Secretary Lloyd of Britain who spent some time in the galleries during their

visit here.

2. Leaders of all parties paid tribute to External Affairs Minister Smith, who died Tuesday.

3. At the suggestion of Lionel Chevrier (L—Montreal/Laurier), a debate on Canada-United States relations was discontinued out of respect to Mr. Smith and a liberal non-confidence motion defeated without formal division.

During the interim supply debate, H. W. Herridge (CCF—Kootenay West) adroitly—though with frequent difficulty—managed to discuss the labor strike in Newfoundland.

DISALLOW LEGISLATION

He said the CCF believes the federal government should disallow legislation passed recently by the Newfoundland legislature, decertifying the striking International Woodworkers of America (I.W.O.A.).

He also urged the government to reconsider its rejection of requests by the Canadian Labor Congress and Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland for an independent inquiry into the labor situation in that province.

Newfoundland member C. W. Carter (L—Burin—Burgoyne) disagreed with Mr. Herridge's allegations that individual rights and freedoms were abrogated by the Newfoundland labor legislation.

The legislation merely took away one union's bargaining rights, Mr. Carter said. And that he added, "was not a right; that was a monopoly."

One monetary matter, Mr. Bendickson said that when interest rates were declining Mr. Fleming took credit for it. But when rates were going up "he absolves himself from any responsibility."

NARROW RELATIONSHIP

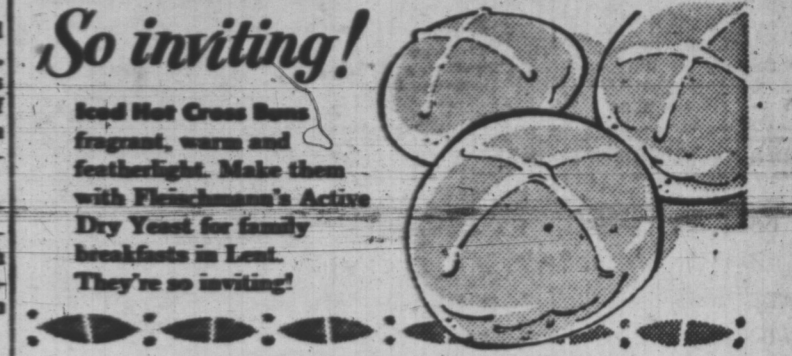
Mr. Bendickson, a former parliamentary assistant for finance,

said the relation between interest rates on federal government bonds and those of private corporations has never been so narrow.

This was an indication that "the traditional confidence in federal government bonds does not prevail at the present time."

Douglas Fisher (CCF—Port Au Prince) said it is time for a taxation study of the pulp and paper industry.

The industry claimed it has to bear a crushing rate of tax and thus could not carry out its responsibilities for proper forest management.



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Sold 1 1/2 c. milk
 Stir in 1/2 c. granulated sugar
 2 tsp. salt
 5 eggs, unbeaten
 1 c. crisp breakfast cereal

Cool to lukewarm
 Measure into large bowl
 1/2 c. lukewarm water
 Stir in 2 tsp. granulated sugar
 Sprinkle with 2 envelopes Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast
 Let stand 10 min., stir well.
 Stir in lukewarm milk mixture and 2 well-beaten eggs
 Sift together twice 2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour
 3 tsp. ground cinnamon
 1 tsp. ground nutmeg

Turn out on lightly-floured board and knead until smooth. Divide into 2 equal portions; form each portion into a 12" roll and cut into 12 equal pieces. Shape pieces into smooth balls. Place well apart on greased cookie sheet. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk—about 45 min. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 12 to 15 min. Brush hot buns with corn syrup and mark crosses with thick Confectioner's icing.

Ch'town Resident Faces 2 Charges

A city man charged on two separate counts of being drunk and disorderly had his case adjourned until Saturday when he appeared in City Police Court yesterday morning.

Another Charlottetown man charged with being drunk and disorderly was fined \$50 and costs or 20 days in jail when convicted. Evidence disclosed that he had been picked up by police in an intoxicated condition and was using foul language within the hearing of women and children.

A 40-day jail term was given a city man of no fixed address when he pleaded guilty to a charge of vagrancy.

Five persons charged with being drunk and incapable comprised the remainder of the docket. Two residents of the city each received 20-day jail terms while fines of \$20 and costs or 10 days and \$10 and costs or five days were given two other city residents. A resident of St. Peter's Bay was fined \$5 and costs or two days.

Magistrate K.M. Martin presided.
