Great Lakes Water Levels Show Decline

OTTAWA (CP)—Water levels in the Great Lakes are well along in their annual winter decline and the prospect for improvement next summer does not look good.

Levels of lakes Superior and Ontario are controlled and do not vary as much.

Heavy precipitation in the spring and summer could make a difference but the lake levels usually depend on precipitation over the last two years as well as precipitation and evaporation during the current year.

Senator's Retirement Comes After 30 Years

OTTAWA (CP) — Senator Adrian K. Huggasen (L—Quebec) is retiring effective Jan. 1 after serving 30 years.

Senator Huggasen, a 75-year-old Montreal lawyer, said he has sent his resignation to the Governor-General.

Legislation passed in 1965 provides for an annual pension of \$2,000 for senators who retire at age 75 or older.

The latest retirement brings the number of Senate vacancies to seven. There are three in Ontario and one each in Quebec, British Columbia, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Standings in the 102-seat Senate are Liberals 61, Conserva-

tives 21, independents 2 and independent Liberal 1.

Senator Huggasen was born July 5, 1901, at Ashford, Eng. He was the first Baron Brabourne, a former member of the British Parliament.

He was an unsuccessful Liberal candidate in the 1955 federal election and was named to the Senate Jan. 12, 1957.

He is chancellor of the Anglican diocese of Montreal and a former batonnier of the Quebec bar. He also is a director of Canadian Marconi Co. and International Paints (Canada) Ltd.

Between 1950 and 1952 he served as assistant government leader in the Senate.

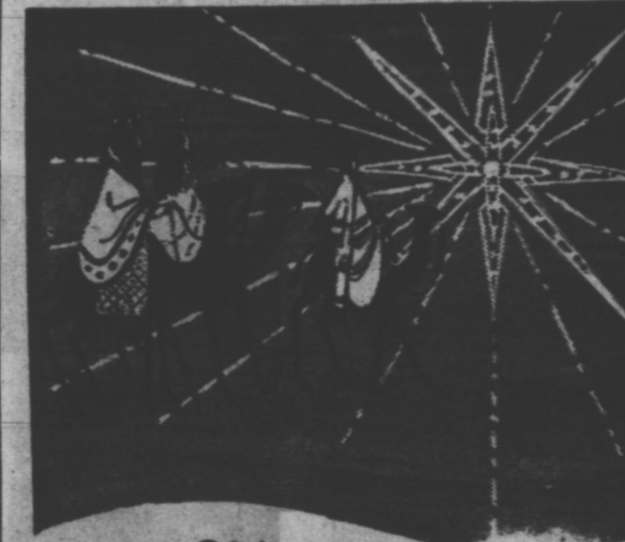

TOPLESSES WAITRESSES TOO SHY FOR DISPLAY

LONDON (Reuters)—Bare-breasted waitresses desperately clutching trays to their chests in an offbeat London restaurant — and refused to let go.

The girls had brought the topless dress back to London — legally this time — but were too shy to allow a packed house more than a glimpse of what it came to see.

The girls, all former models, simply did not have their hearts in their job.

The nervous girls turned their backs, held their trays high, lit cigarettes and smiled over their shoulders to defend their modesty.

They were chosen for good looks and an average 36-inch bust — restaurant owner Paul

Inga said anything over that length droops.

"This only confirms what I know already," said one of 350 guests.

"See one and you've seen 'em all," said another.

But one waiter had to tell an over-ardent guest: "Keep your hand in your pocket, mate."

A London Council official said the council could take no action against the girls because they were in a private club.

Toplessness first arrived in 1964 when two sisters were taken to court on indecency charges for appearing bare from the waist up at a movie premiere. They were discharged but warned not to appear that way again.

Bishop Gaggling Clergy, Anglican Minister Claims

VANCOUVER (CP) — An Anglican minister, with a fresh vote of confidence from his parishioners, charged Wednesday his bishop with gagging the clergy.

Rev. James McKibbin, 31, issued a four-paragraph statement after he was confirmed as minister of St. Andrew's Anglican Church by members of his congregation who also urged him to accept conditions imposed by Bishop Godfrey Gower.

Bishop Gower told a closed meeting of more than 150 parishioners Tuesday night that if they voted to confirm Mr. McKibbin's post he would require all ministers in his diocese to consult with him on experimental forms of worship and check with him before participating in TV or radio broadcasts.

Reports of the meeting and Bishop Gower's remarks were published by Vancouver's two daily newspapers.

Mr. McKibbin hit the news in November when he joined Rev. Harold MacKay of University Hill Church in staging a so-called psychedelic religious service which included a jazz band and a gogo girl. No drugs were used. Portions of the service were used on a CBC TV network show.

SENT LETTER TO PRIESTS Bishop Gower sent a critical letter about the service to all priests in his New Westminster diocese.

Mr. McKibbin said Wednesday: "It was Bishop Gower who insisted the press be kept out of the meeting."

Further, the bishop has gagged all the clergy. He has ordered that henceforth all clergy must have his approval before they make statements in the press from public platforms or before they make radio or TV broadcasts.

"The bishop not only forbids the press to be present at the meeting, he also insisted that all present sign a statement that they are valid members of the parish."

"As the bishop has forbidden all clergy to speak without permission, and as I do not have his permission to speak, I will therefore obey his lordship and make no further statements."

Bishop Gower told the meeting that the relationship between the Anglican and United Churches had been damaged by what had gone on. He said he had a number of complaints concerning Mr. McKibbin's work.

The bishop said there were complaints that Mr. McKibbin had displayed insufficient courtesy and knowledge in dealing with questions on a radio open-line show.

Separatist Clears House In Debate On Navigation

OTTAWA (CP) — Separatist MP Gilles Grogan cleared the Commons during a 10-minute adjournment debate on winter navigation on the St. Lawrence River.

Only Transport Minister Pickersgill, there to reply to Mr. Grogan (Ind.—Quebec) in the adjournment debate, remained in the 26-seat House as the Quebec member spoke.

Stanley Knowles (NDP—Winnipeg North Centre) wandered in midway through the seven-minute Grogan critique

of government transport policy. A handful of Liberals deliberately stood behind the curtains on the government side of the House. They tried unsuccessfully at one point to stop Solicitor-General Pennell from getting something in his desk during the boycott.

The Liberals, about 10 of them, came in when Mr. Pickersgill began his three-minute reply.

Mr. Grogan complained that a Soviet ice-breaker would be clearing the St. Lawrence again for winter shipping while the Canadian fleet of 25 ice-breakers remained idle.

He harangued Mr. Pickersgill for saying recently in Halifax that he felt nothing should be done to accelerate ice-breaking for winter navigation.

DISMISSES COMPLAINT The minister dismissed the complaint about the Soviet ice-breaker as based on a newspaper report that hadn't proved accurate last year.

No Soviet vessel that tried to "deal with problems in our territorial waters" would be welcome, he said.

It would cost "many, many millions of dollars" to taxpayers across Canada to keep the river navigable in winter and he indicated that the traffic wouldn't warrant the expense.

Eventually year-round navigation would come but right now it was costing considerable less to subsidize the cost of winter traffic in Halifax and Saint John, N.B.
