### THE S. S. GASPEZIA.

### MARTYRS IN CHINA.

Christain Missioners Burned to Death.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 17.—J Fleming, an English Missionary, has been killed by natives and soldiers at Tsing-Ping, 90 miles east of Kue-Yeng. The mission house was raided and burned down. There has been no attempt to punish at the hands of the mandarins.

A French missionary has been burned to death at Swatow. The mission was attacked, and Catholic crosses and altars destroyed by a mob of a thousand Christian-haters. All escaped to the mountains but the French priest. The fleeing women were not pursued, as the priest stood his ground. He was tied to the bedpost and the house set on fire, the missionary being consumed in the flames.

At Shan-Tung soldiers raided the German Lutheran mission. They told the missionaries if they moved out they would not be molested. One Freimuth told them to do their worst.

They ran Freimuth through the body and threw him into a creek. He crawled away in the night, and was taken care of by a friendly native until his death.

### FIGHTING FOR LIFE.

A Dreadful Scene at Sea.

LIVERPOOL, December 15.—The survivors of the British steamer Clan Drummond, which foundered in the Bay of Biscay a fortnight ago, arrived here yesterday from Lisbon, where they were taken by the British steamer Holbein, which picked them up. All of them are reticent about the disaster, but the statement has been elicited from them that the crew fought a fierce gale for hours, when a tremendous sea struck the ship sheer abeam, staying in the main hatch, through which the water poured in torrents. The wave carried away everything before it. The Clan Drummond then began to go down, and boats were lowered, when the Holbein came close up and took on as many of the Clan Drummond's people as possible. The captain of the Clan Drummond was being hauled on board the Holbein, when the Lascars of the crew of the former vessel who were fighting for their lives, pulled him into the water and drowned him. The fourth officer of the Clan Drummond reached the deck of the Holbein safely, but was swept overboard by a huge wave and drowned. Several Europeans on board the lost ship were drowned by the frantic Lascars, who dragged them down into the water in their wild efforts to save themselves.

### British Military Activity.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—The war department has just placed contracts among a number of Birmingham manufacturers for the supply of 10,000 metal cartridge cases. The Kings-Norton Metal Company alone has undertaken to supply 2,500,000. The contracts are all marked urgent. This large order can hardly be regarded as tending to alleviate apprehensions concerning the possibility of an outbreak of war. In fact the only inference to be gathered therefrom is that the situation with regard to France, Russia and the Transvaal continues extremely critical.

### Lord Curzon Sets Sail.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—Lord Curzon, of Kedleston, the new viceroy of India, started yesterday for Marseilles, overland, to join Lady Curzon on board the Arabian there. A party of friends, including his father, the Rev Alfred Nathaniel Holden Curzon, Baron Scharsdale, Lord George Hamilton, the secretary of state for India, the Duke of Westminster. The United States charge d'affaires, Henry White and Mrs White bade them farewell at the railroad station.

### Armenian Troubles.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 16.—According to reports received here, the outrages by Moslems on the Christians in Armenia are increasing. In addition, there is great distress among the Armenians, who in many places are starving. Unless aid is brought them soon, the widows and orphans who survive the massacre will be wiped out.

### The Catholics and Cuba.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: "In response to the Vatican's inquiry on the subject, President McKinley has sent an assurance that the Catholics in Cuba and the Philippines will enjoy the same ample liberty as the Catholics in America. The Washington government has also promised the pope that measures will be taken to prevent provisional government's despoiling convents or seizing ecclesiastical property. The pope has sent his warmest thanks to President McKinley."

### A Year's Work on the Clyde.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The year's returns as to the shipbuilding operations on the Clyde, published to-day, show an output which reaches the enormous total of 446,911 tons. The vessels which go to make up that immense tonnage include 232 merchant steamers, nine men-of-war, eight steam yachts, fourteen racing yachts, and only one sailing vessel.

### THE KAISER AGAIN.

Opinions About Great Britain and France.

BERLIN, Dec. 17.—According to a communication received by the Berlin Borsen Zeitung from a parliamentary source, the Emperor recently, upon the occasion of his receiving the officers of the Reichstag, remarked that there had been many changes affecting the relations of the great powers. Within the past few weeks, he said, it has become manifest that the antagonisms of certain interests were making themselves felt more than formerly, and under the circumstances account had to be taken of these antagonisms, which might result in decisive issues.

The Emperor referred to the success achieved by the vigorous English policy at Fashoda, but said it must be admitted that it was not certain that the Anglo-French differences had been completely adjusted.

Referring to the Anglo-German colonial treaty, the Emperor said the arrangement was accomplished owing to the friendly and accommodating spirit shown on both sides and Germany might expect to gain advantages thereby. Owing to the turn of the international situation, the Kaiser added, Germany was in a position to apply herself to the protection of her own interests.

### The Gordon Memorial.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—The business men of Montreal are determined that Canada shall have a share in the Gordon memorial College which Lord Kitchener is about to establish at Khartoum. It is understood that the movement has been started by Lord Strathcona, which will help the list with a substantial subscription, notwithstanding that he has already subscribed \$5,000 to the London fund. The members of the board of trade met this morning to form the nucleus of a movement which shall be shared in by all Canada and the boards of trade in the various cities will be asked to do their share.

### A Rigorous War Office

LONDON, Dec. 16.—The war office authorities are rigorously enforcing their right to prohibit the intrusion of artists or photographers in the neighborhood of military fortifications. Their extreme circumspection is illustrated by a recent occurrence. One of the pictorial magazines has commissioned a volunteer officer to write a discreet article on "Home Defence," which it was proposed to publish with an embellishment of photographic views. The war office heard the proposal with great disfavor, and on permission to take the photographs being applied for the request was curtly refused. The detention of strangers of doubtful appearance has been an unusually frequent occurrence of late in the neighborhood of military works.
