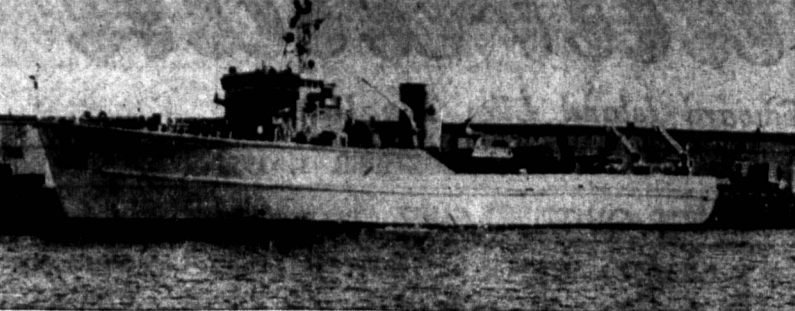

Mulholland, manager of the Charlottetown branch. Arrangements were made some time ago to lease the building which at one time housed the Massey-Harris showrooms. The firm of Crockett and Storey Ltd. now own this building, which they have been using as a warehouse. Plans have been completed covering the necessary renovations, and work on this project is slated to commence in the near future. The Bank premises will occupy the front section of the main floor.

APEC Officers Elected Yesterday

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—R. J. Rankin of Halifax, vice-president in charge of public relations of the Halifax Herald Ltd., and immediate past president of The Canadian Press, Friday was elected president of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council.

Mr. Rankin, named a director of the council in July, succeeds Mayor R. Whidden Ganong of St. Stephen, N.B.

Mr. Rankin, 60, has been chairman of the Halifax post commission since 1953. He became president of The Canadian Press in 1954 and in April, 1955, was re-elected for a further year.

His election came at the conclusion of the first annual APEC meeting. The council was formed in 1954 by Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island businessmen to boost the area's lagging economy. It is an offshoot of the Maritime province board of trade, operating with support of the governments of the four provinces.
