

CURRENT NOTES.

A firm in Central Ontario, in remitting for the Monetary Times from June, 1881, up to June next, considerably says: "We apologize for neglecting to remit sooner, for we well know, even when the accounts are small, that in the aggregate it amounts to a large and useful amount. We have found this too true in our trade; but it is a matter creditors seldom ever consider, or if considered, is seldom acted upon."

On British railways, aggregating some 18,000 miles, there were 522 persons killed and 2,072 others injured during the six months ending June 30. As the mileage of railways in the United States at the same time was about six times as great, the same proportion per mile would show 3,132 persons killed and 12,436 others injured in six months, or no less than 6,264 killed and 24,872 injured in a year—matter is vastly more than the actual number of deaths and injuries by railway operation in that country. Of course in Great Britain the traffic is greater per mile of main line, and the population far more dense than in the United States, but it is also evident that in spite of the extreme care with which railways are watched and operated there, they are terribly destructive to life and limb—the great majority of the victims, of course, being their own employees.

The sixth volume of the Canada Short-horn Herd Book is ready, and it will soon be followed by the seventh. The same comprehensive plan adopted for the fifth volume is carried out in the sixth. A world of labor has been bestowed upon condensing pedigrees and in preparing indices to the names of the animals and their breeders. It should be mentioned that, under the method now adopted, a tyro in Short-hornology can tell whether a registered animal traces back to imported stock on both sides, or only goes back to a grade cow. This is an important point, to which due importance has not been attached by some writers on Herd Book subject. Mr. Wade, the Secretary of the Agricultural and Arts Association, is entitled to the highest praise for his intelligent and laborious work in the preparation of the volume.

On December 18th the jubilee of 300 years of Russian rule over Siberia was celebrated. The exact date of the annexation of the vast region subjugated by Yermak and his Cossacks—a territory three times larger than European Russia—is altogether unknown to Russian history, and little trouble seems to have been taken to discover it. All that is known as a fact is that some time between the 28th of October and the 27th December, 1582, the Muscovite Czar Ivan the Terrible received a messenger from Yermak, and accepted dominion over the country, which had been voluntarily subdued by the Cossacks under their celebrated chief. In this difficulty it was thought fit to appoint the 18th of December, it being also the name-day of the young heir-apparent, Nicholas Alexandrovich, as a day of thanksgiving and festivity throughout Siberia.

London World:—Mr. Chamberlain's speech at Ashton is the utterance of a man who has great confidence in the political future. The President of the Board of Trade sees that before many years the leadership of the Liberal party will be vacant, and he is evidently prepared to assert his claims to the position. In a few years Mr. Gladstone's political life will be over; and in the course of nature Lord Hartington will be called, at no distant date, to the House of Lords. Who, then, is to become the leader of the Liberal party? Mr. Goschen is too Conservative and Whiggish for Liberalism, even as it is, and he will be much more so for Liberalism as it will be. Mr. Foster has made himself impossible; and Sir W. Harcourt's Liberalism is distrusted by a large portion of the party, even if he should not have, by that time, received his quietus in the House of Lords. It can scarcely be doubted that in a few years the leadership of the Liberal party will lie between Mr. Chamberlain and Sir C. Dilke. Lord Beaconsfield once said Sir C. Dilke would never be Prime Minister of England, but I should be disposed rather to back Mr. Chamberlain. The Tories evidently regard him as the coming man. They hate him with an energy which can only be due to the belief that he will, in course of time, become the most powerful man in the State, and that when that day comes it will go hard with class monopolies and privileges.

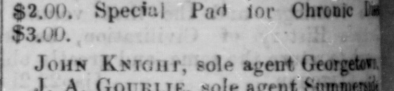
