LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

ANOTHER SUMMER CARNIVAL.—The Halifax Board of Trade has passed a resolution in favor of holding a carnival in that city next season. The proposed carnival is to last four days and will include a luncheon, regatta, yacht races, military and naval reviews, illuminations on the harbor and in the gardens, and a variety of other attractions.

RENEWAL ACCIDENT.—Yesterday afternoon while Col. Moore and Mrs. Moore were driving out to the Colonel's home at Watermark, Brighton, one of the bolts of the carriage broke and the shafts dangled about the horses' legs causing them to run away. Both occupants of the carriage were thrown violently out. Col. Moore, we regret to hear, had his wrist dislocated, but Miss Moore is pleasingly to hear, escaped without injury.

THE OPERA HOUSE.—The entertainment given last evening by Mr. Spedon attracted a large audience to the Opera House. The three or four character sketches by Mr. Spedon indicated the possession of considerable dramatic talent. His sketches were also cleverly done, excepting in two or three instances dealing with local subjects, where the resemblance was not very striking. Mr. Spedon will give an entertainment in Summerside tonight.

SWEETHEARTS IN THE JUDGES.—The Young Men's Mutual Improvement Society of Hicksville, L. The wives and sweethearts are to act as judges, and will decide, of course, in favor of the resolution. It is expected that this open discussion of the question will be followed by a number of weddings in Hicksville.

SCOTT ACT AT SOURIS.—There were several regrettable inaccuracies in the report of the Scott Act cases tried before Mr. Blanchard at Souris, as received by The Examiner. The persons found were Angus McCorneak, Frank Larkins, John McInnis, all of Souris, and Daniel McPhee, of Grenville. The summonses against the following persons were dismissed for want of evidence: John D. Laver, Philip Johnson, Charles Anderson, Frank McInnis, of Souris, and Angus McPhee, of Grenville.

THE HORSE TRADE.—D. H. Elliott, live stock and meat salesman of Liverpool, writes W. G. Elliott, of Montreal, as follows: "The trade in American and Canadian horses during the past week has had an upward tendency, and the demand for useful horses has been in excess of the supply. The horses especially sought for are sound draft horses with plenty of hair and bone, weighing from 1,400 lbs. upwards, which have been realizing from \$15 to \$10. Trainers perfectly sound and weighing from 1,000 lbs. upwards, from \$25 to \$28. Also good bays or which have been realizing from \$30 to \$32. The demand for the above class is likely to continue for some time, and for light horses there is no sale whatever, and it is useless supplying this class to the English market."

THE CHAPPELL CASE.—The assistant jailer of Queen's County jail, yesterday afternoon, in obedience to the writ of habeas corpus, produced Emeline Chappell before Mr. Justice Hodgson at chambers. No person appeared to show cause against her release, and Mr. Hodgson, who acted for the girl, asked for her discharge on several grounds, and also produced a written consent from the convicting magistrates and pro-secutor, Judge Hodgson ordered the prisoner's release, stating that he did so in obedience to the writ, as the writ of commitment was defective and illegal, on the ground stated by Mr. Hodgson. The little girl, who was released without a friend, was then taken in charge by a gentleman present and a temporary home secured for her. There was considerable interest taken in the case, and quite a number of citizens attended the hearing.

Prof. Henry Barnard was a man of fine ability as an educator. He was a native of this city, and his eldest brother is C. W. H. Barnard, of Summerside.

The Upper Stewards' correspondent, of the "Travis Sun," of Toronto, writes that he has been the guest of several of our young men in search of fine horses and other improved stock. 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NEWFOUNDLAND'S Smuggling Cases Postponed. St. John's, N. L., Oct. 21.—A death blow was given to the smuggling case today by the defence raising a legal objection, claiming that the law does not cover the cases as arraigned and procuring a writ of prohibition from the supreme court restraining the magistrate from continuing the case until the issue is argued before that body. This struck the lawyers like a bomb-shell and they are greatly elated. The argument takes place on Saturday.
