Record Intimate Details of Canadian Life For Posterity

OTTAWA, (CP) — The government is carefully preserving for posterity the concise, intimate details concerning some 9,000,000 Canadians.

These are the housewives and farmers, storekeepers and ditch-diggers, bankers and clerks and host of other Canadians caught up in the country's great recording of humans in the national registration of wartime 1940.

Do you recall being asked whether you can drive a truck, a tractor? Whether you can milk a cow? The replies to these and dozens of other questions are being permanently inscribed on microfilm and stored in steel vaults for future reference.

WILL PROVE AGES — The big, \$60,000 — microfilming job, being carried out by a bureau of statistics staff of 21, is principally for the purpose of providing proof of age for old age applicants who cannot present birth certificates.

Every month there are about 2,600 requests from pensions officials across the country for search of the records to help establish applicant's ages.

But there also are other uses. The RCMP, for example, is making increasing use of the 9,000,000 master cards to obtain information speeding up investigations of suspected persons.

And in the event of another mobilization, the vault of biographies will provide a rich storehouse of information on the characteristics and capabilities of a cross-section of Canadian people.

70,000 A DAY — The microfilming was started last November and is expected to be completed next December. At first progress was slow, but now the microfilm cameras are photographing the cards at the rate of 70,000 a day—35,000 in each of two cameras.

The names and jobs of the registered Canadians, their racial and regional backgrounds, their 1940 health and skills, and all the other information about them is being squeezed to the point where 6,000 cards are recorded on a film strip of 100 feet.

When the master registration cards required 10,000 square feet of storage space, the film rolls—1,500 of them when the job is completed—will require only one-tenth that space.

Officials feel the film strips will be useful for the next quarter-century or more.

Freak Snowstorms In Parts Of Europe

VIENNA, Austria, (Reuters) — July snowstorms crashed down on Austria, Yugoslavia and Germany Thursday, bringing warnings of avalanche danger in the Bavarian Alps.

The freak summer brought Iceland its heaviest downpour of rain in years, and there is serious flooding in Austria.

MONTREAL (CP) — Three Ottawa men, charged with stealing two bags of air mail, were acquitted Wednesday by Judge Edward Archambault. Lawrence La-violette, Valmore St. Germain and Harold Rogers were freed after they told the court the mail bags destined for Vancouver, were found by them May 10 on a street in the north-end of Montreal.

Baltimore is preparing receptions galore for 100 Norwegian boys due to arrive in the Maryland port about July 20 aboard the maritime training vessel "Stataard Lehmkuhl". The handsome full-rigger sailed from Bergen June 16.
