SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Fishery Regulations.

OTTAWA, April 25.

In view of the damage done to sea fisheries by the practice of leaving mackerel nets in water during the day time, new regulations have been adopted providing (1st) that no nets used for the purpose of catching mackerel, herring or gaspereau shall be set or left set at surface or within twelve feet thereof, in water between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m., between 1st June and 21st August in each year; (2) no fleet of gill nets of greater length than 60 fathoms shall be set to any single mooring between 1st day of June and 21st day of August. Contravention of these regulations renders persons caught liable to heavy penalties.

Mayor Thomas Sentenced.

HALIFAX, April 25.

Mayor Thomas, of Truro, appeared before the bar of the House of Assembly Saturday night and was sentenced to forty-eight hours in jail for contempt. The greatest interest was manifested in the case, and the excitement in and about the Parliament building on Saturday evening was intense. A large delegation from Truro was present who cheered the Mayor lustily as he was hustled off to his dungeon cell. The case comes before the Supreme Court on habeas corpus this morning.

An Atrocious Crime.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 25.

All circles in society here are greatly perturbed because of a horrible deed committed by one of the Czar's trusted servants, a highly talented man. The man in question is the choir-master of the private chapel of the imperial palace at Peterhof. While in a delirious frenzy he murdered his wife, after which he chopped her body into fragments which he burned in the stove. He then threw his three children into the river.

Grit Frauds Exposed.

HALIFAX, April 25.

The committee of privileges, which has been investigating the charges of fraud and other offences against the Grit M. P.'s for Cape Breton and Victoria Counties, presented two reports. A majority report, signed by Grits, completely whitewashes the accused members, but admits irregularities. The minority report finds the members for Cape Breton guilty of all the offences charged against them. The reports will be discussed to-day.
