Rev. Dr. Frank Baird Dies Suddenly

FREDERICTON, June 22 - (CP) Rev. Dr. Frank Baird former Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, died suddenly here today.

Interested in literature, he produced works on a variety of subjects including religious and historical.

Of Scottish ancestry, he was associated closely with the Chipman area of New Brunswick and was educated there and in Fredericton. He graduated from the New Brunswick Provincial Normal School and the University of New Brunswick. He taught for a time in Lower schools of the province and also was principal of Albert and Kings County high schools.

His theological course was taken in the Theological College of Presbyterian Church in Halifax. He also studied at New Presbyterian College and University of Edinburgh. He had Presbyterian Churches at Sussex, N.B., Woodstock, N.B., Bedford and Picton, N.S.

He received D. D. Honoris Cause from Presbyterian College Montreal, and LL. D., Honoris Cause, U. N. B.

In 1930-31 he was moderator of Presbyterian General Assembly of Canada.

His wife was Miss Sara McKern of Fredericton. One son, Hamilton, Montreal and a daughter Mrs. H. V. Pritchard, Fredericton, survive.

King's County Fish, Game Ass'n Meeting

The annual meeting of the King's County Fish and Game Protection Association was held last night at the United Church Hall, Souris, with the vice-president, Mr. Alan MacLean, presiding.

The minutes of the last annual and the last regular meeting were read by the secretary, Mr. Harold Landry, and approved as read. It was moved by Mr. Roy White, seconded by Mr. Joseph Henessey that the King's County branch support the recommendations put forth by the Queen's County branch that the season on Hungarian Partridge be the same as last year, from October 1 to November 11, but that the 1 to November 11, but that the season on pheasants run from October 15 to November 11, an additional 11 days this year, and that the bag limit per day be three birds either cocks or hens.

Considerable discussion followed on the "posting of property," and Mr. Spurgeon Jenkins, game warden, explained to the members what "posting" entails respecting those who enclose their properties. He said that the owners might put up a simple "No trespassing" sign and then be personally responsible for the protection of the property, and prosecution which followed. If, however, under the new regulations the land is declared "enclosed," and registered as such with the Provincial authorities, then it was the duty of the game officer to protect the land and institute prosecution. But if the land is so "enclosed" then the farmer himself cannot shoot on it, as it will be regarded as a sanctuary. He pointed out that

many farmers had posted their properties in order to keep off the hunters who shoot on their land, while at the same time they were shooting themselves, not only on their own "enclosed" land, but also on the "unenclosed" land of other farmers who were not keeping hunters off their property. The onus of the decision of "posting" remains entirely with the farmer, but it is expected that it will be pointed out to him that such "posting" will prevent him from shooting on his own property, and if apprehended he will be subject to prosecution. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mr. Alan MacLean; vice-president, Mr. Roy White; secretary, Mr. James Brennan. After some discussion regarding the use of rifles in target shooting and the shooting of birds other than game birds, the meeting adjourned.



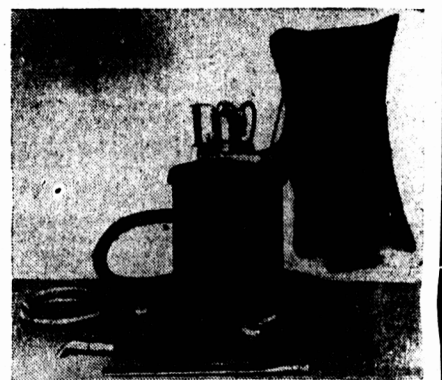
