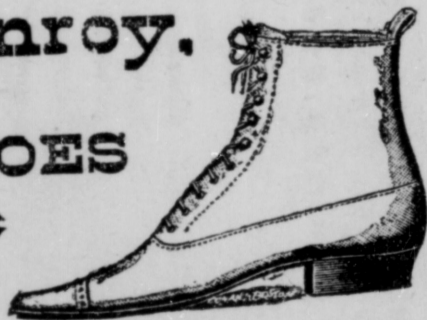

ARREST OF BANK OFFICIALS

Charged With Making False Statement of Bank's Affairs.

MONTREAL, Aug. 17.—A sensational development in connection with the affairs of the suspended Ville Marie Bank took place when warrants were issued for the arrest of William Weir, President of the Bank, Fred Smith, Director, and Ferdinand Lemieux, Cashier, on a charge of making false statements regarding the bank's affairs.

Gales and Floods in Chili.

VALPARAISO, Aug. 17.—Terrific gales and heavy floods continue near Santiago de Chili. A train fell into a river from a railway bridge and fifty people were drowned.

Canada's Honey Crop.

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—Percy Selwyn, agriculturist who has been gathering statistics for the Government, reports that the honey crop of Canada will not amount to above one fourth the yield of last year. This is attributed to the late spring, which resulted in the hives being weaker than usual.

The Plague.

BOMBAY, Aug. 6.—The plague of Poona is daily becoming more virulent. The natives are panic-stricken, and are fleeing to the country in all directions. The streets are deserted. The relatives and friends of the dead leave hurriedly the moment the funeral pyre is lighted.

HONG KONG, August 16.—There were 22 deaths from the plague during the past week, and 25 new cases were recovered.

Georgian Bay Canal

OTTAWA, August 15.—From private advices received in the city it is learned that the surveyors at work on the Georgian Bay canal route have made a glowing report of the conditions at the "height of land" near lake Nipissing. It is said that they have discovered the conditions very favourable for a deep waterway, and that the estimated cost at that point will be much below the original estimate.

Sir Charles Interviewed.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—Sir Charles Tupper, leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons, who arrived at Liverpool on board the steamer Parsian, when interviewed regarding the Alaska affair strongly urged two alternatives, either that the United States should submit the controversy to arbitration or that Canada should construct a railway to Dawson City, thus opening up a purely Canadian line of communication with the gold fields.

Trouble in Servia

MOSCOW, Aug. 16.—Despatches from Belgrade say that the peasantry in the farming districts near that city is raising an uproar in opposition to ex King Milan. The military is taking stern measures to repress disorder, and in conflicts thus far 20 peasants have been killed, 16 wounded and 118 arrested.

Ex King Milan, fearing that Knejevitch, the Bosnian, who attempted to kill him, may make uncomfortable revelations, has again postponed the trial of the would-be assassin, and the Radicals who are accused of having been in league with him. The Roumanian Government has refused, in the absence of evidence of guilt, to extradite M. Sivokevitch, the Servian dragoon, who is charged with having assisted Knejevitch.

HURRICANE AT THE BAHAMAS

Great Loss of Life and Property—150 Bodies Washed Ashore.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Aug. 17.—Advices received here state that a West Indian hurricane visited the Island of Andros, of the Bahama group, inflicting great damage to property and completely wrecking the shipping. 150 bodies have been washed ashore.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 17.—A gravel train ran off the track near Lawlor's Lake yesterday. Thomas Houriham, a laborer, was killed, and another man named John Connell had his arm hurt.

Northwest Crops.

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 16.—The weather is warm and fine, and the cool wave of the past week having passed without frost, the farmers breathe easier. If the weather continues fine wheat cutting will be general next week. The Canadian Pacific crop report to-day shows prospects of a heavy yield all along the company's line. Cutting has commenced at many points, and all agree that the yield will be the heaviest for several years.

Unfavorable Report.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 16.—Reports from the French treaty coast indicate that the results of the season's operations thus far are very unfavorable to the French cod fishers and lobster packers. The catch in both these staples is far below the average and altogether inadequate to remunerate the French for the expense of maintaining fishery operations in that quarter.

Boodle at Quebec.

QUEBEC, August 16.—The Soleil announces that within ten days tenders will be called for the enlargement of the graving dock here, for which Parliament recently voted \$117,000. It also exposes that work on the new Intercolonial Railway station at Levis involving an expenditure of \$80,000 will be commenced within the same period.

France and China.

HONG KONG, Aug. 16.—A paper published in Macao, the Portuguese seaport at the southwest entrance of the Canton River, reports that France has occupied the island of San Chau, west of Macao, as an assertion of her right to the Province of Kwang Tung, in the event of the partition of China.

LABORI RECOVERING

Removed to the Residence of Prof. Bach.

DREYFUS ASKS FOR A POSTPONEMENT OF THE CASE UNTIL MONDAY

RENNES, Aug. 16.—At 8 o'clock last evening Labori was removed in an ambulance to the residence of Prof. Bach, in a suburb of Rennes. He stood the journey well, although naturally fatigued.

The doctors are extremely hopeful of a speedy recovery, but consider it would be unwise for him to return to court until there is absolutely no danger of a relapse.

Maitre Demange has decided therefore to ask for an adjournment, which has necessitated a written application by both Demange and Captain Dreyfus, who have already sent letters to the president of the court martial. Col. Jouaust will undoubtedly accede to the request, but he cannot grant an adjournment for more than two days, when the application must be renewed. Captain Dreyfus wants the sessions postponed until Monday next, when it is hoped that M. Labori will be able to be present.

Dreyfus has written two letters to M. Labori. The first, on hearing the news of the attempt to murder the lawyer, is a spontaneous expression of his shocked feelings. The second is a touching epistle expressing the prisoners' keenest regrets at the dastardly outrage, profound gratitude to M. Labori for his heroic championship and heartfelt wishes for his happy recovery.

MARTYR'S STAKE AT AUCTION

Interesting Relic of the Ill-Fated Bishop Hooper.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—An interesting relic of the ill-fated Bishop Hooper was yesterday sold. It is a portion of the stump cut from the stake at which the Bishop was burned in St. Mar's Square, Gloucester, in 1555, as an obstinate and irreclaimable heretic. The stake was taken up to make room for the foundation of the present monument. A greater part of the stake was used in fashioning a casket which was presented to the daughter of Mayor Broughton, of Gloucester, on the occasion of her marriage.

An Austrian Dreyfus.

VIENNA, Aug. 17.—August Moset, a high Government officer in the Department of Railways, has been arrested for stealing documents regarding plans for the mobilization of troops in emergencies, which had been deposited with the Department of Railways. The French and Russian Governments were informed of the plans.
